THE TOLEDO MEETING

TOLEDO, Ohio, July 19.—The free-for-all pace, is the first race on the program for the Grand Circuit Meeting which will open Monday. Last year, in this event, Miss Harris M. and Single G. placed a world's record to the credit of the new track, by pacing three consecutive heats below two minutes, and while the stage is set for an attack on the 1:58 1/4, 1:59 1/4, 1:59 3/4, it is very doubtful if there is anything in the field to force last year's winner below even time.

The Tecumseh Purse for 2:14 trotters is the feature event on the card for the first day. The first of the colt McGregor the Great with which Cox won at Kalamazoo on Thursday will if started be the favorite as his second heat in 2:05 1/4, makes him look like one of the best Peter the Great trotters in training.

Hollywood Naomi who finished second to him in that mile is also eligible as well as the Cleveland winners Constantine the Great, Fenesta and Peter Coley although the last two failed to repeat at Kalamazoo.

Two early closing events will appear on Tuesday's card, one being the Maumee Purse for 2:06 trotters and the other the Crescenus Purse for two year old trotters. In the latter it looks as if the Laurel Hall entry Nat alle the Great has the speed of the party. She won at Cleveland in 2:15 1/4 and at Kalamazoo in 2:13 1/4. Geers finishing second in both events with Dudette. At Kalamazoo Cox made his first start with Daystar, and at the finish of the race divided third and fourth money with Sister Azoff.

In the Maumee Purse Geers will be given another opportunity to duplicate his Kalamazoo performance with Heir Reaper. The black horse was forced out in 2:04 1/4 by Royal Mack while the Toddler, Busy's Lassie and Prince Loree were very active competitors. With a good day and track the winner of this race should beat 2:04.

The three-year-old trotters and the 2:06 pacers will be the attractions on the third day of the meeting. As Andrews did not ship Abbie Putney to Kalamazoo Murphy won the three year old event with Brusloff. He is not eligible at Toledo, however, as the race is for youngsters Abbie Putney and the Geers Billy Mollie Knight by General Watts. Both of them showed at Cleveland that they can beat 2:07. The list of eligibles to the 2:06 pace presents the name of Frank Dewey, Grace Direct, O. U. C., Red Baron, South Bend Girl and Symbol Baron, all of which are in the first flight of racing material.

Mary Coburn the second member of Andrew's stable appears among the nominations to the Fort Miami Purse for 2:09 trotters on Thursday. Her second to Allie Lou in 2:04 1/4 at Cleveland will give her considerable support in a field with Echo Direct, with which Lyman Brusie won at Kalamazoo in 2:07 1/4. Mignola, Don de Lopez, the Substance, Red Bon and Petrex. Direct C.
