TURKEY PURCHASES THE RIO DE JANEIRO

VIENNA, Oct. 14, (Special)—It is reported here that Turkey has purchased from Brazil the superdreadnought Rio de Janeiro, which has just been completed by Armstrong, Whitworth & Co. at Newcastle-on-Tyne. The Rio de Janeiro is a twenty-two knot vessel and displaces 27,500 tons.

BELFAST, Oct. 14, (Special)—The Ulster Liberal Association has issued a manifesto announcing that the Ulster liberals would disregard the authority of the proposed provincial government and claim the protection of the forces of the empire in defence of their liberties "which would be gravely imperilled by the success of the anarchistic movement led by Sir Edward Carson."

CONGRATULATIONS ON PANAMA CANAL

LONDON, Oct. 14, (Special)—Editorials in recent London newspapers heartily congratulate the United States on the practical completion of the Panama Canal.

The Daily Telegraph says the whole world has watched with admiration the skill and courage with which the American engineers have overcome almost insuperable difficulties. The Morning Post speaks of the gratitude that is due Ferdinand De Lesseps, who started the cutting of the canal in 1881, and says the completion of the work by the Americans is a new monument to his pioneering energy. The newspapers print long articles explaining the engineering of the canal and the probable results to world shipping and commerce.

The Daily News says it thinks the canal will prove a strong temptation to the United States to create something like a protectorate over Latin America.

THREE IN RACE FOR CONGRESS SEAT

WHEELING, W. VA., Oct. 13.—A spirited campaign closed today in the First congressional district of West Virginia, preliminary to the special election to be held tomorrow to choose a successor to Representative John W. Davis, who resigned his seat in the House to become solicitor general in the Wilson administration. Three candidates are contesting for the seat. The Democratic nominee is Major Mansfield M. Neely, a prominent young lawyer of Fairmont. The Republican nominee is State Senator Julian C. Hearn of this city, while the standard bearer of the Progressive party is George R. Laughlin, also of this city, who made the race against Davis last November on both the Republican and Progressive tickets.

Politicians generally regard the election tomorrow as the most important by-election to be held this fall. The contest is attracting more than ordinary attention because of the large labor vote and the big manufacturing interests in the district. The new tariff law is now in operation and though it is early for the people to pass a conclusive opinion on it, nevertheless the result of the election will be seized on as an expression of labor and the manufacturer toward the new tariff.

The district is normally Republican. There have been elections in the last twenty years when the Republican candidates had majorities around six thousand. John W. Davis, who carried the district twice, was greatly helped by his own popularity and his high standing as a lawyer. At the present time the Democrats are confident of holding the district, especially as the normal Republican vote is expected to be split between the regular Republican and Progressive candidates.

E. R. A. CONVENTION.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., 13.—The "safety first" movement is to come in for a large share of attention at the thirty-second annual convention of the American Electric Railway Association which met here today for a session of four days. Other matters that are scheduled for consideration are the relief of traffic congestion in cities, profit sharing with employees, the present tendency of public service laws and regulations, and the relation of carriers to the development of the territory they service.

In point of attendance the present convention bids fair to eclipse all of the previous meetings of the association. Nearly 400 companies, which control about eighty per cent of the electrically operated railways of North America, are represented at the gathering. In conjunction with the meeting there is an elaborate plant and equipment and the latest inventions and improvements in exhibition of electric railway the way of safety devices for the protection of passengers and employees.
