Miss Lou Johnston, Peters Road has received the following letter from her brother in France, Sergt. R. A. Johnstone, 301022, 22nd Howitzer Battery, B.E.F. It will be remembered that another brother Lester is a prisoner in Germany and has not been heard of since August 1st. His father Mr. Samuel Johnstone, expects that he may be released and arrive home at any time.

Belgium, 11-11-18

DEAR SISTER,—I take this opportunity of writing you this morning.

You can realize our feelings this morning. Everyone is happy. We have just received orders that hostilities cease at eleven o'clock, it is now 10 o'clock, one more hour to go, as far as we are concerned it has ceased now as there has not been a shot fired in fact we never went into action this morning at all.

Well sister we are now reaping the benefit of all our hardships of those last three years. Victory is ours! Those last few days we have been marching through one of the finest countries I have ever seen, just one mass of towns and villages, this part of Belgium is a great mining center. What a reception we received from the civilians on the way through, they would give us anything they were owners of. They had us decorated up like Christmas trees with flowers and flags. Not forgetting their beer and cognac, I would not have missed it for anything.

We took up this position last night, so this morning we are looking right down into Mons that place we have heard so much about those last few years. Our

infantry are through the city. Orders have just come to prepare to move forward again. I can realize the reception we will get going through Mons this morning. We will soon be home again, probably before spring.

I was so sorry to hear of Leith Graham getting killed, Bessie was wanting me to find out what I could about him. Tell her it was so long after his death that I heard about it, and we are pushing on all the time, that it was impossible for me to get any information about him and I do not even know what company he belonged to, and no one seems to know anything about him. No doubt he is buried away back in the rear of Cambria where so many of our boys are lying. I did not know the date he was killed so could not say where the 26th was. However, if they could give me the date he was reported killed, and his number and company I may be able to locate his grave if we should happen to return through that part of the country which I do not think we will, or at least I hope we do not except on the train on our way home. That country only brings back unpleasant memories.

Mrs. J. H. Vandierstine, Hunter River has received the following letter from her son:

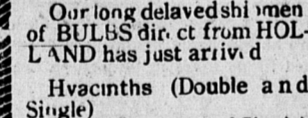
Vallencennes, France,  
Nov. 13th, 1918.

DEAR MOTHER,—Just a few lines today to let you know I am well and getting along fine. I guess they are having some fine celebrations in Canada now over the armistice. They had a big time here last Sunday with a speech by the President of France on the relief of the city by the Canadians. It hasn't been damaged at all hardly and the people were sure glad to see us after having the Hun here for four years. It is on the Frontier of Belgium and France. I don't know when we are going to get home but when you receive this I expect I shall be in Germany with the army of occupation and don't know how long that shall be for, but everything will have to be settled before we leave there so if you don't hear from me very often during the following month you will know we are on the move
