THAT 'HORRIBLE MESS' IN THE MAR. PROVINCES

With reference to a "special to the Standard" article reproduced in several newspapers, headed "Amateur Athletics in Maritimes seem to be in a Horrible Mess," the writer heartily agrees with the heading—but that is about all. Yes, amateur athletics in the Maritime Provinces are in a horrible mess, in fact in a deplorable and disgraceful mess, the like of which has never been experienced in Eastern Canadian sport circles.

Just when things looked rosy on the horizon and an era of successful sport in the offering, a temporary official, probably felled with his great responsibility and with an eye to permanent office, "starts something." He wakes at some great length, and most eloquently on the wholesale reinstatement of athletes by President Sammy Doyle, or perhaps he compromised a little and laid it to the door of the executive. At any rate President McVicar of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, over two thousand miles away from the Maritimes, was informed of this "terrible misdeed" of trying to promote better athletics in the Maritimes.

Not having any jurisdiction nor even the power to interpret the constitution, the President, practically unknown and unheard of in the provinces by the sea starts right in with very little investigation to show the Maritime fathers of sport, just where they get off—hence the "horrible mess," and the most peculiar part of the whole affair, the majority of representative clubs are in favor of the M. P. B. procedure. According to McVicar his procedure may have been in keeping with Doyle, but not with Hoyle, even if it did happen to matters down here. Hence, once again the "horrible mess," which the writer predicts won't be straightened out until Doyle again takes the helm.

The article in part states that he strongest of Nova Scotia clubs, Vanderers and Crescents and Dartmouth will present an unbroken front in their demands. These clubs may be strong financially or in membership, but the writer falls into where they get their strength when it comes to field, rack or hockey. That is what an athletic club, is organized for, the fostering of clean sport and in that fostering glory and prestige in the different lines of athletic endeavor is supposed to be the watchword. This to my mind is what makes an athletic organization strong.

It seems that the larger maritime centres are the weakest in athletics and the strongest in demands. It is so long since Halifax, Dartmouth clubs won a Maritime title, either on track or field that the prowess of these clubs has almost been forgotten. On the other hand the smaller town athletic clubs which seem to be bringing home the bacon in all lines of sport. How many—and it's the smaller clubs that are in favor of Doyle, with a few exceptions. For example the following clubs are behind Doyle and his executive: Nova Scotia, Sydney, Glace Bay, New Glasgow, Westville, Stellarton, Pictou, Trenton, Antigonish, Amherst and others. New Brunswick: Fredericton, Weston, the majority of clubs in Saint John city and a 50-50 split in Moncton. Prince Edward Island: Abergweits, Victorias, Y. M. C. A. Pictou, Saint Dunstons, League of the Cross, Crystals, Summerside. This constitutes the whole province. The above therefore does not look as if the Maritime Executive was in disfavor in the Maritime Provinces.

If worse comes to worse there is surely nothing under the sun to hinder the forming of a Maritime organization independent of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. A charter is not needed, just merely the affiliation with the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States and the different athletic federations of Europe and also the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

A "horrible mess" indeed, and he author of the article above referred to and published in the Standard certainly made a horrible mess of his composition when he stated that Sam Doyle, as president of the M. P. B. of the A. A. U. of C. was in disfavor in the Maritimes.
