Well Katie with regard to this war I can't tell you very much, expect our side is doing good work. Our Canadian boys certainly get good praise over here. I heard times were pretty good down around Souris and Rollo Bay. I would like to take in a good old-fashioned dance. Here's hoping to in the future, as I think victory will soon be here. I heard there are quite a few of the boys in training. I am sure you must miss Francie for he was a jolly chap.  
 Now dear sister I hope you are not worrying over me for I am all right. have been up the line quite often and having good luck, and lots to eat. We expect to rest soon and will write more often. Now I must close. Give my kindest regards to all enquiring friends. Lots of love to Mother and Dad and all the rest not forgetting yourself. Write soon.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age who has obtained a section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.  
 Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
 In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$100 per acre.  
 Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning home-land patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.  
 A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.  
 The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
