Rev. Samuel Howard, formerly of Cornwall, recently delivered a very powerful address on The Liquor Question before the Every Day Club at St. John. The saying of Moses, repeated in later time by Jesus, that man cannot live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God, was made the basis of his remarks. He showed that the saying was true of nations, for history showed that in the case of Rome, when mere sensual pleasure becomes the aim in life, a nation rapidly decayed. Proceeding, he dwelt upon manhood, upon character, as the great aim in life, and upon the evil wrought in men by the liquor habit. He said he had talked with men engaged in the liquor traffic who admitted that it was a bad business, but argued that a man must live. Mr. Howard took exception to this statement. A man was under no obligation to live a life that ruined other lives. Every man was, however, under an obligation to live right.

WHO DISTRIBUTED THE PAMPHLET?

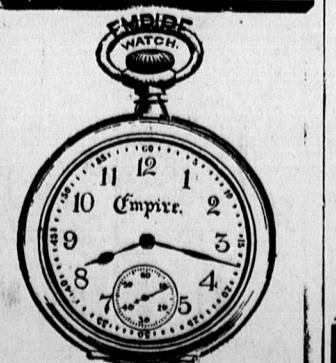
