

NEW ZEALAND MINISTER ENTERTAINED AT OTTAWA

In Reply to Toast in His Honor Proposed by Right Hon. R. L. Borden Seconded by Sir Wilfrid Laurier He Gave an Instructive Address On Imperial Obligations.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, May 1.—Col. The Hon. James Allen Minister of Finance, Defence and Education in New Zealand was the guest of honor today at a luncheon given by the Canadian branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association.

He had definite ideas, he said, as to the naval defence policy. The New Zealanders could not come to the help of Canada, nor Canadians to the aid of New Zealand unless the ocean was kept under British control.

WIRELESS MEN TIE UP LINERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 30.—The strike of the wireless operators inaugurated here last week continues to spread. Already 350 operators have left the land stations and vessels entering Pacific Coast ports. The situation is becoming serious, as the Federal Government will not allow vessels to leave port without two wireless operators on board, and as a consequence sailing dates are being cancelled.

SUFFRAGETTE MILITANCY

LONDON, April 30.—The British home office to-day inaugurated a more active campaign to put an end to suffragette militancy. The headquarters of the Women's Social and Political Union, where many outrages are said to have been organized, were occupied by the police, and all the active leaders taken into custody.

CRUELTY OF OFFICIALS

BERLIN, April 30.—The outrageous cruelty practised habitually upon private soldiers of the German army by their superiors was brought vividly to mind again by the ordering of a court-martial to enquire into the death of a member of the Imperial Body Guard, caused by ill-treatment.
