She is survived by a son and daughter by a former marriage, William S. and Miss Georgiana Durant, and eight sisters and one brother.

"The following notes have been received from Kingsboro, Lot 47. The farmers of Kingsboro are busily engaged sawing and splitting their firewood.—Our good neighbor Milton Young is doing a rushing business with his circular saw, cross cutting firewood. With good men at his back he manages to get clear of about forty team loads a day.—The school teacher, Miss Dorothy Macdonald, and the Postmaster, H. J. Robertson are giving the best of satisfaction. As a community all ought to be proud of their willingness and ability in discharging the duties laid upon them without any partiality."

OTTAWA, March 21.—Senator Andrew Archibald Macdonald of Prince Edward Island died at one o'clock this afternoon at his apartments in the Hotel Cecil. He was 83 years of age on February 14 last, and was held in high esteem by his brother Senators and public men generally.

Senator Macdonald, was descended from a long line of Scottish ancestors. He was born at Brudenell Point on February 14, 1829. His grandfather Andrew Macdonald, was in early life a merchant doing a large business in Arisaig, Scotland, which he closed in 1805 and purchased 10,000 acres of land about Three Rivers, Lot 22 Prince Edward Island. He also bought Pamunee Island, comprising over 700 acres of beautiful wooded land at the entrance to Georgetown harbor, and there he located, and conducted a merchantile business, exporting timber and building ships for the British market. He had a family of twelve sons and three daughters.

His son, Hugh Macdonald, father of the Senator, inherited the Brudenell Point and Pamunee Island property, and in due time was elected a member of the Provincial Assembly. He was also a Justice of the Peace, and at various times Collector of Customs and High Sheriff for the Province. His son, Andrew Archibald Macdonald, Senator, now deceased, has filled a large place in the commercial, official and political history of the Province. At the age of fifteen he entered the store just then opened by a cousin in Georgetown and soon was taken in as a partner. On his cousin's death, in 1851 he bought his share and continued the business, taking in as partners his two brothers, Archibald J., and Austin. The firm of A. A. Macdonald & Brothers carried on a large mercantile, fishing and shipbuilding business till 1873 when the senior partner removed to Charlottetown.

His entry to political life was made in 1853 when he was elected to the Legislative Assembly for the Georgetown District. He held this seat until 1860, and in 1863 was elected to the Legislative Council which he held till 1873 when he was appointed Postmaster General. He held that position until the Province was united with Canada, and was there after Postmaster of Charlottetown, with supervision of all the post-offices in the Province.

Much earlier, in 1864, he was appointed one of the delegates to the Conference held in Charlottetown with the design of uniting the three Maritime Provinces. Failure in that object resulted in the famous Quebec Conference in October of the same year, which laid down the basis on which the Dominion was formed. The delegates to that Conference, of whom Mr. Macdonald was one, are now recognized as the Fathers of Confederation. One by one death had summoned the Fathers to their reward, until but three remained alive. When Sir Hector Langevin died in 1906 only Sir Charles Tupper and Senator Macdonald were left. The

death of the latter leaves Sir Charles the sole survivor of that illustrious company.

In 1884 Mr. Macdonald was appointed Lieutenant Governor of his

native Province in which office he served with universal acceptance for five years. He was called to the Senate in May, 1891, following the death of Senator Haythorne. He was

one of the better class of public men who in nearly three score years of public life pursued a faithful public course and was held in high regard and respect by all.
