command of her and took her to Quebec, where he handed her over to the Department to get ready for the Governor General where Supit. McConry looked after her. Capt. Martin, K.C. on "Development of Municipal Government. 6983-31-11. he Governor General was through with her the Quebec Capt. was sent down to Sydney to take her to Quebec when she left Halifax chief officer in charge where I took command of her Sept. 1912. Read, please give the names of who went up? Mitchell is in Halifax and if you don't remember, please write him and get their names. I applied for the car ferry and got her. Capt. Read went round with a petition for signatures and did not get her. I also wrote letters to Queens and Kings County men to get Earl Grey and did not get her. Why? That is for the public to say. By his own statement he was not very well known when he wrote for Earl Grey. He makes quite a fuss over me leaving Summerside route with Stanley the same day he left the Charlottetown route with Minnow. Wined from Pictou that it was his plan to try Charlottetown and was going to Georgetown, where I arrived at 6 a.m. following morning and found Minto tied to Googetown wharf. Can Capt. Read deny that? Did he ever cross in the ice-boats from Tormentine to Cape Traverse—if so, how often? I crossed there only 4 times, first in 1872 when a boy with Capt. Nuttall. Will Capt. Read tell us if he knows who wrote the two letters against Capt. Brown when he was caught in the ice off Sea Cow Head or somewhere in the straits? The firm of Welsh & Owen answered these letters. EATING WITH BRITISH ROYALTIES. A CAKE. 2 lbs. fresh butter, 1 lb. Carraway seeds, 4 ordinary spoonfuls of good yeast, 10 eggs with 5 whites, 3 large spoonfuls of thick cream.

TWELFTH NIGHT CAKES. Make a cavity in the centre of 6 lbs. of fine flour in a basin, dissolve a gill and a half of yeast in a little tepid milk, and work it into the centre of the flour to make a sponge. Place round it 1 lb. of fresh butter in small lumps, 1 1/2 lb. of sifted sugar, 1/2 lb. washed and dried currants, 1/2 oz. sifted cinnamon, 1/4 oz. pounded cloves, grated mace and nutmeg to taste, and sliced candied orange, lemon, citron peel to taste. When sponge is risen, mix all together with a little warm milk, have the hoops well prepared and buttered, and fill with the mixture, and bake them till ready. When almost cold ice some over with sugar and water.

CHEESE CAKES. Copied by Princess Victoria 1836, Kensington.—From very ancient Recipe Book.

There were many these cakes made for the Queen Consort of King Henry VIII. This Queen Consort was very partial to these cakes. A cook shop in Richmond also made cheese cakes for her. Put 3 quarts of creamy fresh milk to a gill of rennet let it stand in a warm place and when well "set" drain it thoroughly and mix into it with the hand half a pound of sweet fresh butter, sweeten to palate with fine sugar, and add a few loafed currants, a little citron, candied orange and lemon peel, cut small, an ounce of whitened and pounded Jordan almonds. Then beat up 3 eggs with the mixture, sheet the pans with fine and light pastry. Fill them with the curd, and bake them in a swift oven. The paste may be made with 1/2 lb. of sifted flour, 1/4 lb. of fresh butter, and cold spring water, mixed lightly and rolled out.

MAIDS OF HONOUR. Boil 1/2 pint milk and 2 table-spoonfuls of fine white bread-crumbs together for 15 minutes, along with 2 ozs. butter, grated lemon peel to taste, also sugar. Then add 3 eggs well-beaten and stir mixture till quite thick. Strain through a sieve. Line small cheese-cake tins with puff pastry, half-filled with mixture and bake.
