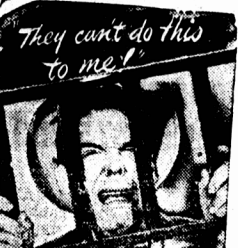

Complete Loading Cargo Of Seed At Georgetown

The S.S. Lake Traverse completed loading a cargo of seed potatoes at Georgetown yesterday afternoon and sailed about 4:30 for Cuba. Aboard the ship were 40,000 bags (some 66,000 bushels), loaded by the Associated Shippers Inc. The cargo is likely to be the last to leave the port this season. Some 25 carloads of potatoes remain in the potato warehouse at Georgetown and it is expected they will be forwarded by rail during the winter.

The Lake Traverse was partially loaded at Souris and arrived at Georgetown on Tuesday to complete her cargo.

There is no sign of ice in the Georgetown Harbor and both ferries, Lower Montague and Newport, are still running.

Terms of U. K. Wheat Agreement

Canadian wheat is presently being supplied to the United Kingdom at \$1.45 per bushel plus 3/4 cents carrying charges for No. 1 Northern basis Fort William. Under the provisions of the second year of the United Kingdom wheat agreement in 1947-48 in 100 million bushels in the form of wheat and wheat flour. The price of wheat for use in Canada is still under control and is currently \$1.58 1/2 per bushel. No. 1 Northern including 3/4 cents carrying charges. Wheat prices to countries other than the United Kingdom are established by the Canadian Wheat Board and monthly quotations has been \$2.38 per bushel No. 1 Northern basis Fort William.

The wheat contract with the United Kingdom guarantees a market to Canadian farmers for 160 million bushels in 1947 and a minimum of 140 million bushels in each of the years 1948-49 and 1949-50. The price for the year 1948-49 has been fixed at \$2 per bushel and the price for the final year of the agreement is to be announced before December, 1948. The price however, will not be less than \$1 per bushel. On the basis of the agreement the current initial payment of \$1.35 is being paid to producers.
