### RESTORING COLOR TO FADED RUGS.

FROM OVERSEAS.—The friends of Gr. John Conroy son of Mrs. (Dr.) Conroy of this city are pleased to see him home again after nearly four years of service in France. He left here with No. 11 Ammunition Column in April, 1916 and served afterwards in the 43rd Howitzer Battalion. He was with the Battalion through Ypres and the Somme and was then transferred to Major Stanley's Battery, Pte. Conroy took part in many great battles, including Ypres, Somme, Vimy, Hill 17 and Passchendaele. He was wounded in the back at Ypres. He was in France near Mons when the armistice was signed and left there on May 1st.

TIMELY RESCUE.—While a large motor boat, with fifteen people on board, including women and children, was coming down North River on Sunday the exhaust pipe burst, and the boat began to fill rapidly. Fortunately Pte. Geo. Lund who was sailing around in his motor boat, saw what had happened and hurried to the rescue. He succeeded in taking off the party and enabling the other boat to be headed out and brought to the shore. This is the second time that Pte. Lund has affected a rescue recently, the other occasion was when he went after a boy who was being blown out to sea in a small punt during a northerly gale.

ORGANIZATION MEETING.—A splendid meeting was held last evening in the Liberal Conservative Committee rooms. The attendance was very large and much enthusiasm was manifested. The object was to organize the city and Royalty for the coming contest on the 24th inst. The meeting was addressed by the two candidates Mr. Paton, M. L. A. and Mr. Brown. The former gave a brief review of the past four years and referred to the part of the programme which the Government have in view. Mr. Brown also received a splendid hearing and both candidates made a decidedly favorable impression. The committees appointed went to work immediately with an energy and zeal that was commendable.
