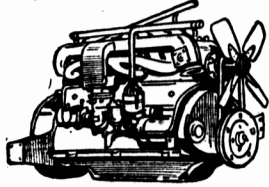

Saint Mary's Defeat Junior Canadiens 7-2

HALIFAX, Jan. 6 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's crushed Montreal Canadiens 7-2 tonight in a bruising contest that was the first of a two-game junior exhibition series between the two squads. Second game will be played tomorrow.

Referee Reg Beazley enlisted the aid of a policeman in the second period to eject Montreal captain Joe Lepine from the game after the doughty defenceman had taken exception to a two-minute minor penalty for boarding. Lepine was awarded a misconduct and match-misconduct as well and Canadiens coach Frank Currie withdrew his club from the ice for 10 minutes.

St. Mary's, defending Maritime champions, pounced on the Montreal team early in the first period and the middle period was half gone before Canadiens could stem the tide. By then it was too late to do much about it.

Led by its first-string line of Bert Hirschfeld, Elmer MacGillivray and Hughie Campbell, Santamarians ran ahead 6-0 before Montreal could reply late in the second period with goals by Gilles Dube and Bob Fryday. Halifax tacked on their seventh and last goal early in the third period.

Montreal never got under way properly as St. Mary's fore-checked relentlessly throughout the hard-bumping match. Santamarians ghosted around Canadiens defence with apparent ease and displayed considerable polish when they scored in the vicinity of the opposing goal. Lepine had played a stout game up until the time he was banished and his going didn't help matters any for Montreal.

Nine penalties were imposed, eight of them to Canadiens. Two of those eight went to Howe Moroz, Jr., who, in the general enthusiasm which pervaded the Forum, was entirely overlooked by Halifax fans.

Hughie Campbell rang up three goals and three assists for the winners, figuring in all out one of St. Mary's goals.

More than 5,000 Halifax fans attended.

Walcott Wins From Maxim In 10-rounder

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 6 — (AP) — Ageless Jersey Joe Walcott rode into the spot he's always wanted, leading challenger for the heavyweight title, by outpunching Joey Maxim of Cleveland, O., tonight in a slugish 10-round bout at Convention Hall.

Walcott scaled 191 pounds, Maxim 191.

Walcott won largely on Maxim's refusal to fight. Jackie Kearns' protege kept his right hand wrapped until the ninth round and closed with a terrific flurry of blows but Walcott had piled up too big a margin in early rounds.

The Camden, N. J., negro, who started his ring career as a sparring partner for Joe Louis, thus avenged a loss to Maxim in Camden last summer, in which the Clevelander won an unpopular decision.

Saint John Defeats Moncton Hawks 5-3 In Rough Encounter

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 6 — (CP) — In a rough, overtime game marked by a total of 14 penalties, the cellar-dwelling Saint John Beavers rallied tonight to clip the wings of the long-leading Moncton Hawks 5-3 in a Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture.

After Moncton had gained a 3-0 lead, Beavers tied the score before the end of the third period and shot home two more during overtime.

Walter Butler performed the equalizing act and tallied Saint John's fourth marker in overtime. An open net provided an easy target for Kyle in shooting the fifth after Hawks took out their goalie in an effort to tie things up.

The lone first period goal came Moncton's way while Moose LaBlanc was doing penance in the sin bin. A ganging play ended with Mouse Dowling making good on a pass from old-timer Sammy McManus, who is runner-up for league scoring honors. Dowling shot the goal at 12:03.

Hawks played without Poirier and Bell, while Beavers were minus the services of Whalen.

The visitors increased their count to three within eight minutes of the second period before Beavers, who missed numerous opportunities, finally found the range.

Doug Leadbetter scored the No. 2 Moncton tally on a pass from Demchuk, and then McManus added another to his lone string. He was helped by Dowling and Bucko Trainor, who leads the league in assists.

Before the middle frame ended, Joe O'Toole brought Beavers into the running with two goals. Fitzgerald and Kyle gained assists.

Kyle and Colwell helped Butler to score the equalizer shortly after the half-way mark of the third period.

It was Butler again who finally put Saint John ahead at 4:27 in overtime. He was unassisted.

During the last minute of play the Hawks used their goalie unavailingly as another forward, and the Moncton net open Kyle ended the Hub hopes at 9:36.

Babe Ruth's Condition Is Satisfactory

NEW YORK, Jan. 6 — (AP) — Babe Ruth, baseball's most famous player, was reported in "satisfactory" condition today after submitting to a serious two-hour neck operation at French hospital.

The 31-year-old Sultan of Swat whose 60 home runs for New York Yankees in 1927 and \$80,000 salary in 1930 and 1931 never have been equalled, underwent the delicate operation this morning to relieve intractable neck pain after a series of consultations by six specialists.

There was no announcement as to when he would be released.

Word of the seriousness of the Babe's condition caught the sports world unprepared. Although he had been in hospital since Nov. 26 for reasons variously designated as "observation" and a "sinus infection" there had been no public indication that an operation would be necessary.

In fact the spindly-legged veteran of 22 Major League campaigns and 10 World Series was supposed to have been discharged Dec. 15. His release was delayed because he had a severe headache and his personal physician said it was considered advisable that he remain in hospital until the cause of the head pain was determined.

VINEHARD, N.J., Jan. 6 — (AP) — William Papaleo (Willie Pep), world's featherweight boxing champion, was injured last night in the crash of a passenger plane but he suffered injuries of the left ankle and chest.

The Hartford, Conn., batter was scheduled to fight in Havana, Dec. 21 but his manager, Lou Viscusi, said Dec. 12 that an injury to the champion's right ankle had forced a postponement. At the time he said the injury might force postponement of a Jan. 28 title bout with Nel Tarleton in London.

The plane was en route from Miami to Newark.

HALIFAX, Jan. 6 — (CP) — Jimmy Gray, fast-skating winger who studies at Acadia University and plays hockey for Halifax Crescents arrived back here tonight after a work-out with Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League last Friday at Montreal.

Gray said Canadiens Coach Dick Irvin had asked him to finish the season with Montreal Royals of the Quebec Senior Hockey League Canadiens farm-club, and continue his studies at McGill University.

Gray said, however, that he had decided to complete his year with Crescents and with Acadia.

Four years later she won the senior title for the first time. She has held that crown ever since.
