Burglars Enter Four Stores In Montague

Early Monday morning four stores at Montague were entered by burglars. They were the Egg Grading Station, Moshers' Meat Market, the Blue Dome Restaurant and Carl Boehner's jewellery store. Apparently the jewellery store was the heaviest loser, as a quantity of watches and rings were taken. At the restaurant, owned by Selma Llewellyn, a quantity of cigars were taken. In each case entry was gained by breaking a window. Five people living about the restaurant and jewellery store did not hear any noise. One other resident reported hearing noises, but thought it was a rat.

At the Egg Grading Station the burglars took a radio, which was found later. At the Moshers' Meat Market no money was taken. The proprietor was checking to determine if anything else was missing. Like the other stores, entrance was gained by breaking glass.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police are investigating.

Suspended Sentence For Theft At Geo'town

A resident of Georgetown yesterday was given a two-year suspended sentence when he pleaded guilty to the theft of two crates of lobsters, valued at \$40. The accused posted a bond of \$500. The case was tried before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald.

Charges were laid after a watchman at the C. H. Llewellyn cantine plant on Queen's Wharf seized a man with two crates of lobsters in a dory. The watchman heard a noise about 3 a.m. Sunday morning. When he investigated he found a dory under one of the arches of the wharf. Jumping into the boat he seized the man. Some 300 lobster crates were at the wharf, it was reported.
