TODAY IN DOMINION HISTORY

This date forty years ago, August 13, 1873, was an important day in Canadian history. The Canadian Pacific charges against the Macdonald ministry were then to the fore, and had divided the new Dominion into two hostile partisan camps. Earlier in the year the allegation had been made in the House of Commons that the Government had connived with foreigners in connection with the Canadian railway and in order to obtain funds "to debase the constituencies" in the election of 1872. Parliament appointed a select committee, composed of three Conservatives and two Liberals, to carry on an inquiry, and adjourned to August 13th. On that date Parliament was prorogued by the Governor-General, Lord Dufferin, and on the same day a royal commission was appointed to take the place of the select committee. The commission was composed of the Hon. Antoine Pelette, the Hon. James Robert Gowan, and the Hon. Charles Dewey Day, all prominent judges. A little over two months later they reported to the Governor-General, who called Parliament to consider the evidence taken under oath by the commission. A resolution of "severe censure" was moved by Mr. Mackenzie, leader of the Liberal opposition, and a heated acrimonious debate followed. Sir John Macdonald's speech of defence, while a masterly one, did not meet the situation, and he resigned to prevent the passage of the vote of censure. Goldwin Smith, educator, essayist and historian, was born in Reading, Berkshire, ninety years ago today. His long connection with Canadian affairs began in 1871, when he was appointed a member of the senate of the University of Toronto, and continued until his death in 1910.

KNIGHTS TEMPLARS ON PARADE

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 12.—This was the big day of the thirty-second triennial convalescence of the Knights Templars, the day of the great parade, when upwards of 20,000 sir knights, with cross-bilted swords at shoulder, marched through the streets of Denver in one of the greatest demonstrations of its kind in the history of the order. Thousands of spectators were gathered along the line of march to witness the brilliant pageant. Thirty thousand persons, including the governor of Colorado, the mayor of Denver, the officers of the grand encampment and many invited guests, reviewed the procession from the mammoth grand stands in the court of honor. The parade was almost six miles in length. Interspersing the various commanderies were fifty of the most famous bands of the country.
