### SPELLS "HELP" BY PAPER STRIPS KIDNAPPED DOCTOR IS RELEASED

DETROIT Oct. 7.—The single word "help" spelled with strips of white paper on the rear window of a deserted house, effected the rescue today of Dr. Frank L. McPhail, 30, who was kidnapped and held for \$4,000 ransom.

One of the kidnapers, Frank S. vino, who acted as Dr. McPhail's guard, was captured. He claims he was forced to take part in the kidnapping by threats of death.

The young physician was lured from his home last night by a telephone call asking him to come to a certain address to administer to a sick man.

On arrival he was met by three men

with revolvers who took him to the deserted dwelling seven miles from downtown and locked him in an upstairs room.

While one of his captors held a revolver to his temple, he was forced to write a note to his father Dr. Malcolm McPhail, asking for \$4,000 ransom.

Tried to Make It \$10,000.

The kidnapers threatened and argued all night in an effort to make him raise the request to \$10,000. Finally at 7 a.m. Monday, two of them set out with the note, leaving Savino to guard their captive.

Although the physician thought Savino carried a revolver, it developed that he was unarmed. All morning Dr. McPhail stayed locked in the room with Savino standing outside. The doctor had with him a pad of prescription blanks and he busied himself writing notes for help which he slipped out under the frame of the locked window.

Meanwhile the other two kidnapers had approached the elder McPhail with the note and he promised to obtain the money before nightfall.

The notes for help falling, the imprisoned man tore the blanks into strips, breathed upon the window pane and pasted the strips against the glass to form the word "help."

Across the street two girls saw the message and telephoned that "Somebody was acting crazy" in the deserted house.

Police squads released the doctor and Savino surrendered without resistance.

The other two remained at liberty to-night.
