In regard to the extra water supply referred to in the report of C. E. J. Jarvis Fire Insurance Inspector and Adjuster, published in the Guardian of yesterday, the Guardian is informed that the wells have been bored at Gates Mills, the water has been sent away and analyzed, the route for the new main to the present large well at the pumping station has been selected and everything is ready for the laying of the pipe in the spring. Some delay has necessarily been caused in selecting the best locations for the sinking of wells and obtaining the best water. In one case the water was found to be salt at high tide and another well had to be sunk in its place. The water will be pumped to the main by a small gasoline engine. When this work is completed there will be abundant water supply for all purposes.

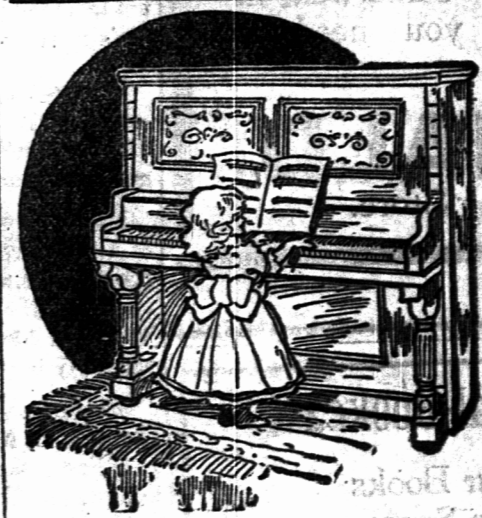
