There can be no fate more miserable than that of the girl who hopelessly loves a married man who has no intention whatever of divorcing his wife and marrying her.

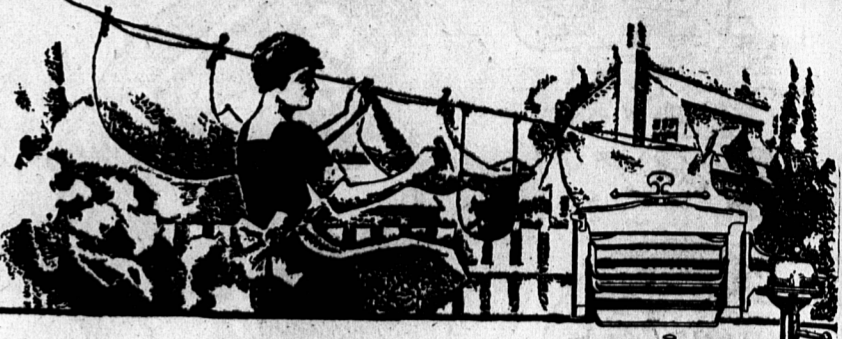

Carnation Shrimp Wiggle 2 1/4 tsp. butter, 2 1/4 tsp. flour, 1/4 tsp. salt, few grains pepper, paprika, 3/4 cup Carnation Milk, 1/2 cup water, 1 cup shrimps, 1 cup canned peas. Make a white sauce of the butter, flour, seasonings and Carnation diluted with water. Drain the shrimps, remove the dark vein; break shrimps into pieces and add to white sauce. Also add the drained peas. When mixture is thoroughly heated serve on toast points. Garnish with parsley or olives. Serves 5.

TOMATO CHUTNEY Take 4 lbs. tomatoes, 2 lbs. apples, 2 lbs. seedless raisins, 1 lb. yellow sugar, 2 lbs. onions, 1 tablespoon mixed spice, 1/4 eggspoon cayenne, 1 cup vinegar. Cut tomatoes into small pieces, put in a basin, cover with salt and let stand for 24 hours. Pour off the liquid and add all the other ingredients cut up, then vinegar. Let it come slowly to the boil and simmer for four hours, stirring occasionally.

Household Hints

Before Washing Stockings If a thin place, small hole or "runner" is noticed in the stocking, darn it before putting it in the laundry. By doing this the hole will not become larger during the washing process. When Canning When canning vegetables, do not use a doubtful sealing jar. Put some product that is easy to keep, such as jam, jellies, or pickles in uneven or chipped jars. Floor Polish Equal parts of melted candle grease and turpentine make an excellent floor polish.
