IRISH PREMIER Says Conscription Only Fair Method

BELFAST, Northern Ireland, Jan. 18.—(CP Cable)—Conscription "is the only fair and equitable method of recruitment for His Majesty's forces," Prime Minister J. M. Andrews declared in a statement today.

The Premier refused, however, to accept a suggestion that his government resign unless the United Kingdom government agrees to enforce conscription to Northern Ireland, where military service is a voluntary matter on account of Eire's opposition to conscription anywhere in Ireland.

Mr. Andrews was replying to a letter by Edmond Warnock, former parliamentary secretary to the ministry of home affairs, who urged the Premier to tell Prime Minister Churchill that the people demand conscription. Mr. Warnock said that Premier Andrews and his colleagues "should inform the government that they will not be responsible for the government of Northern Ireland unless this demand is conceded."

Such an ultimatum, Mr. Andrews said, "would be tantamount to going on a strike in wartime." He recalled the efforts of the Northern Ireland government to seek conscription but "after the most careful study of the situation," the British government had decided against it.

NOT ORGANIZED HERE

No organization has yet been formed to handle waste material in Queen's County, it was learned from Mr. J. Lester Douglas, M.P. last night. However, on his trip to Ottawa this week, Mr. Douglas intends intervening the Dominion authorities about the matter and expects something will be done about waste here in the near future. The City Council several months ago inquired into the possibilities of setting up some organization to collect waste material. On inquiry as to what steps to take, they were informed that the initiative was to be taken by the Dominion representatives in this direction. When no action was taken in this direction, the Carry On Canada Corps took the matter up. After an unsuccessful attempt to get the waste moving to the proper channels, they decided it was not possible to carry on. Patriotic citizens throughout the province are anxious to donate scrap iron, steel, paper and other waste material, but because of lack of organization, are unable to contribute it toward the building of new ships, planes, tanks, munitions, etc. The cost of moving the material to the factories where it can be used, has been advanced as one reason for not being organized.

Sir Shenton Thomas, high commissioner of Malaya, disclosed that Prime Minister Churchill had expressed "conviction" that the Japanese invasion in a message which said that the rulers and peoples of the Malaya States "always stood by us so well in the past" and gave them assurances of final victory.

An artillery-prepared enemy attack was launched Saturday east of Gemas, the mid-peninsula post about 110 miles north of Singapore and "fighting is still in progress," the war bulletin announced.

On reports said that between 800 and 1,000 Japanese—more than at first believed—were killed in their initial encounter with Australian forces on that front and that no new major attack has been attempted against the island, jungle-toughened States in four days.

An official Australian report declared the enemy lost heavily in tanks as well as about eight to one in manpower, but that stronger air support and sufficient reserves were essential to the defence.

Gemas is the inland end of a short Japanese line stretching westward to Tampin, in Negri Sembilan State, just north of the border of Malacca.

S' side Airman Listed killed on Active Service

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—(CP)—Death of three airman overseas was reported Saturday in the 164th casualty list issued by the Royal Canadian Air Force since the outbreak of war.

The list also reported four men missing after air operations overseas, one man missing after an operational flight in Canada, one man a prisoner of war who previously was reported missing overseas and another man seriously ill in Canada.

The list raised to 1,300 the total number of airman officially reported dead and missing in the present conflict.

Three children Die in fire at Temiskaming

TEMISKAMING, Que., Jan. 18.—(CP)—Runned by the loss of his three children in a fire which razed a large tenement house and adjoining annex here Saturday afternoon, forcing 13 families into the street, Donat Labrosse said today he had no idea what caused the blaze. It was known in whose apartment it began.

"I made a small coal fire in the stove before I went to work," he said. "My wife found the house warm enough when she got up and did not touch the fire before going out to a neighbor's. The next thing she knew, somebody was yelling fire and she rushed out into the street to find the building ablaze."

"She tried to get the kiddies but was driven back by the smoke and flames. By the time I heard what was happening, my children were dead."

The Temiskaming Red Cross worked late Saturday night billeting the 50 members of the families driven from their homes. This morning the society supervised distribution of food and clothing for the homeless.

South African House rejects Republic plan

CAPE TOWN, Jan. 18.—(CP Cable)—By a vote of 90 to 48, the South African parliament Saturday rejected an opposition proposal for immediate establishment of a republic of South Africa independent of the British Empire.

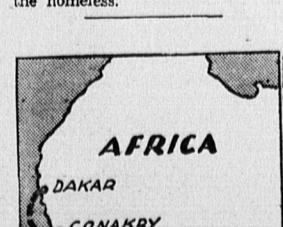
Instead, it adopted an amendment proposed by Prime Minister Jan Smuts approving the Union Government's declaration of war on Japan, Bulgaria, Hungary, Rumania and Finland, and affirming continuation of South Africa's membership in the British Commonwealth.

Parliamentary approval was given by 81 votes to 56 after a debate lasting four days.

R. A. F. bombs Is. of Guernsey

LONDON, Jan. 18.—(CP Cable)—Columns of smoke and steam rose from a quayside after the Royal Air Force bombed the port of St. Peter, Guernsey, Saturday in the first attack on the German-occupied channel since August, 1940.

The air ministry said today shipping was bombed, an anti-aircraft gun shot up and troops machine-gunned, which lies 30 miles off the coast of Normandy, was occupied along with the other Channel Islands during the German conquest of France.



NEW VICHY AIRLINE

Dakar, Senegal capital, has been linked with main French African ports southward along the Atlantic coast by a new passenger and freight air service, stopping at Conakry, Abidjan, Cotonou, Inlaye and Niamey, it was announced.

Most of the route is over the sea to avoid crossing British territory, which alternates with French. The line will use Sikorsky C-43 amphibian planes.

Large Senate vote Against Liquor ban

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The Senate declined yesterday to consider a proposal to keep liquors, wines and beers as far away as possible from American soldiers.

Faced with the same question that arose more than two decades ago, the senate defeated by a standing vote of almost two to one a motion for immediate consideration of a bill to prohibit the sale and possession of intoxicants on all military and naval establishments and adjoining areas.

The action came on the 23rd anniversary of the ratification of national prohibition.
