**A QUIET CAMPAIGN,**

To-morrow will be nomination day throughout Canada and one week later the polling of votes will take place. Thus the country is close to hearing the important moment when the electors must decide between the rival parties and policies. It has been a somewhat exceptional campaign so far. In this Island at least it has created little interest. There is more of indifference and apathy than in any previous general election that we remember. Ask the first ten electors you meet, "How is the election going?" and a majority will answer, "I haven't thought much about it," or, perhaps the answer may be, "I don't know and don't care."

Not a few of those to whom The Guardian has addressed the above question have replied that they never took so little rest in an election and did not know whether they would go to the polls. These are not desirable conditions. Every good citizen should put his ballot in the box. Even if in some doubt as to which party or candidate he ought to support, he should still go to the polls. The office seekers, the contract hunters, and the despicable creatures who are willing to sell their franchise for a dirty bribe or a bottle of campaign whiskey will be there.

It would be an ill day for Canada if the Parliament and Government of the country were selected by such as these, while honest, patriotic citizens who want nothing for themselves but capable administration and just laws, stay away from the polls.

But the fact is that there is little in the declared policy of either party that appeals to the intelligent electors of this Province. On the one hand a gigantic railway scheme, ill considered, enormously costly, engineered wholly in the interest of a great grasping corporation with divided interests, more American than Canadian; and on the other hand a call for higher protection to enable millionaire manufacturers to squeeze more money from our hard-working farmers and laboring men. Prince Edward Island wants neither the one policy nor the other. There is little wonder that our people are apathetic and indifferent. And yet we conceive it to be the duty of every elector, for reasons, above stated, to go to the polls and vote.

"Vote for an all-Canadian railway" by all means. But in what sense is the G. T. P. all Canadian? The only Atlantic port reached by Grand Trunk rails is Portland.

The Patriot says that we ignore certain features of the G. T. P. contract. We do not willingly do so. Will the Patriot read and answer Mr. Wainwright's statement made at St. John? As to the contract of the Railway Commission, Mr. Blair, as late Chairman of that body ought to know what it is worth.

A Montreal despatch dated the 24th and printed in the St. John Telegraph of yesterday affirms that Mr. Blair will speak in the election campaign and that within forty-eight hours the time and pace of his first meeting will be announced. We give this for what it may be worth.

It was almost in the English Channel that the outrage was committed on the Hull fishing fleet. On the Monday morning following the attack the Russian fleet was off Portsmouth, having in the meantime passed the narrowest part of the Channel between Calais and Dover. It would have been easy for the British Channel fleet to have made a short reckoning with the marauders.

It is given out that the Russian Baltic fleet on its way to the east will divide, one squadron going through the Mediterranean and the Suez Canal, while the other squadron will sail around the Cape of Good Hope. The distances are about 11,000 miles by the shorter and 15,000 miles by the longer route. In such an enterprise there are many things to be considered, the exigency of finding coal being a principal one. It is now known that transports with coal have been sent to various South African ports to supply the fleet on its way around the Cape. If the fleet makes 150 miles a day, which is as much as can be expected, the 15,000 mile trip will occupy 100 days, or till February next.

Such solicitude is most admirable, none the less if the Toronto electors should elect the other candidate the Liberals would not be altogether inconsolable. Mr. Foster has been something of a peripatetic statesman. First elected in Kings, New Brunswick, he went to York, and thence to St. John. Then he tried an Ontario constituency at a by-election, but failed to win. After two successive defeats he may or may not be more fortunate this time. Should he fail in Toronto he may go further west, to Manitoba, the Territories or British Columbia. Besides there are others than Mr. Foster who have been sometimes second when the votes were counted. Sir John Macdonald, Sir George Cartier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright were all at various times unhorsed in their electoral battles.
