Steel Shortages Still Troubling Car Industry

DETROIT, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Steel shortages will continue to plague the United States motor car industry through much of the first quarter of 1947. Nevertheless, the car makers begin the second post-war calendar year with a more hopeful outlook than in 1946. Barring prolonged strikes in basic industries, the automobile industry may hit top-level output by summer.

It is generally assumed in trade sources that the car manufacturers pushed their 1946 final quarter car and truck output above the 1,000,000 mark only by digging into materials originally earmarked for use in early 1947 production. They might follow the same procedure during the current quarter, but the fact steel receipts will be lower than originally scheduled because of the impact of the recent coal-mining stoppage on steel mill output.

Authoritative industry sources have estimated the 17-day coal strike up will cost the car industry 265,000 cars and trucks during the first 90 days of this year.

U. S. Steel Magazine Expects Big Boom

CLEVELAND, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Results of a special survey indicate that production of the metal-working industry in the United States reached an all-time record of \$55,000,000,000 this year, an increase of \$12,000,000,000 over the previous high of \$43,000,000,000 set in 1946, the magazine Steel said today.

"To accomplish this volume of production, near-capacity operations will have to be maintained through most of the year and employment will reach new highs, possibly surpassing wartime levels," said the trade journal. "Estimates place employment in the metal-working industry this year at 5,126,000, more than double the pre-war employment level."

Steel-making plants started the new year at a rapid pace last week, with basic steel operations booming to 88 per cent of the factory's post-war capacity, an increase of 11 points over the previous week.

Additional price adjustments were made last week by producers of tubular goods and wire products, reflecting results of cost studies made some time ago, said the magazine.

Saturday Session Dull On New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Stocks Saturday ended a slightly slower week with most market leaders achieving modest advances while many pivots continued to doze in the losing column.

From the start of the short proceedings dealings were among the slowest of the last year. The ticker tape frequently was at a standstill. Advances of fractions to a point or so predominated at the close. Transfers of 300,000 shares compared with 570,000 a week ago and were the smallest since Oct. 26.

Small gains were retained by Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Republic Steel, U. S. Rubber, American Airlines, American Water Works, Public Service of N. J., International Nickel, Texas Co., General Electric and Westinghouse.

Du Pont was off 2 1-4 at 165 1-2 on 100 shares sold just before the closing gong. U. S. Gypsum yielded 2 1-4 at 89. Lower were Southern Pacific, U. S. Steel, Chrysler, Goodrich, Woolworth, Boeing and Union Carbide.

Among Canadian stocks, Canadian Pacific, Dome Mines and Lake Shore advanced 1-4. Hiram Walker was unchanged and Distillery Corporation Seagram was up 3-8.
