Australian Wonder Horse Is Retired

MELBOURNE, Nov. 6 — Misfortune Saturday ended the career of Bernborough—Australia's greatest racehorse since the mighty Phar Lap.

The tall bay stallion broke down during the running of the L.K.S. MacKinnon Stakes at Flemington track here, thus concluding a brief but flamboyant chapter in the racing Down Under.

Suffering from a ligament injury and displacement of bone in a front leg, Bernborough was pulled up by jockey Billy Briscoe and later his owner, Sydney restaurateur A. R. Romano, said he would be retired to stud.

The "Toowoomba Terror" was running second to Flight in the mile and a quarter race and was ready to make his bid when he faltered. He seemed about 50 make the flashing finish which made him the darling of Australian punters during the 10 months the seven-year-old raced on Australia's major tracks.

Bernborough leaped overnight from the Australian back country to the big city headlines. He won 15 consecutive victories — one more than Phar Lap's unbeaten chain.

Today's race was a "weight-for-age" event in which Bernborough entered to avoid the heavy weight placed on him in handicap races. Two weeks ago, in his 17th big-time run since he was given a clean bill to race on important tracks, Bernborough was beaten by the mile and a half Caulfield Cup in which he carried 150 pounds—far above the weight carried by the other horses.

His loss was the first since last December and resulted in his being scratched from next Tuesday's Melbourne Cup for which his handicap was 148 pounds.

Bernborough's story was one of the most fabulous in racing history. The great horse lived in the back country and entered first-class competition at an age when most horses in North America are retired.

Many rumors grew up around the great stallion. One was that he would be matched for large sums against the pick of Australia's thoroughbreds in a special race. Another was that owner Romano intended to take him to the United States.

Had Bernborough gone to the United States, he would have been following the example of his greatest Australian predecessor.

Phar Lap, after a great racing record Down Under, came to the United States in 1922. In his only big race—the 1922 Aris Caliente handicap on the west coast—Phar Lap breezed home in front carrying more than 140 pounds.

Shortly afterwards Phar Lap mysteriously became ill and died. It was thought he ate poisoned herbs while running loose on the range.

IDEAS TO PEP-UP SCHOOL LUNCHEES

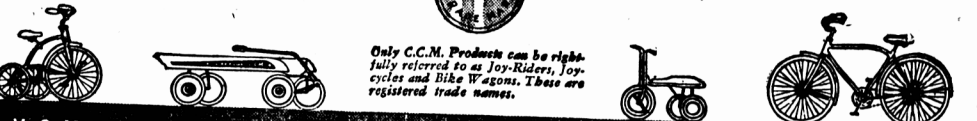

ABSOLUTE ZERO

Where Heat Completely Ceases

By "absolute zero" is meant the lowest temperature compatible with heat, that point of temperature, in fact, at which a body would be wholly deprived of heat and at which the particles whose motion constitutes heat would be at rest. This temperature is supposed to be about 273 degrees C. or 480 degrees F.

The term "heat" is here used in its scientific sense, for as men use the word in every-day language its significance depends on the temperature of the human body. Men call "warm" anything with a temperature higher than their own and "cold" all those objects which have less heat than they. In reality, however, the coldest body known to man is far from being utterly without heat.

Ice, for example, has heat, only in a degree so much below man's temperature that one can scarcely imagine it to be anything but "cold," a term which actually implies a comparatively low degree of heat.

Accordingly the zero of thermometers is only a conventional point marking a certain degree of heat. There seems to be a point, however, where heat ceases absolutely, and this point it is which is known in chemistry as the "absolute zero."

The writer has seen liquid air made to boil by putting a lump of ice in it. The liquid air was so intensely cold that the ice was very hot by comparison.
