## Victories By Tennessee Sue And Billy McVeigh Feature Night Race Card

Tennessee Sue, driven by Dave Wisner, and Billy McVeigh, driven by Walter Craig, raced to double victories in the second night racing program of the season staged at the Exhibition track Saturday. The weather was vastly improved over the opening night and a good crowd witnessed the card.

The Free-for-All dashes featured duels between Tennessee Sue and Gay Law. Sue covered the mile in a neat 2:11 4/5 in the first such dash and clocked 2:12 in winning the second. In both dashes Gay Law forced the issue to the wire, coming through with bursts of speed in the stretch drive.

Billy McVeigh in winning the No. 5 and 8 Classified Pace events showed off strong threats by Shirley H. Temple, driven by Col. J. P. Hooper and Dale B., driven by C. O'Brien.

Reuben Lee, driven by E. A. Bernard, scored an upset win in the No. 1 Classified event when in getting away in the pole position he teams met and even now it looks as if the series for the Island title will be a closely fought one. The three errors by the visiting team were costly and actually meant the difference between victory and defeat.

Baseball fans, and they are legion, will look forward with interest to another meeting of these evenly matched teams. Tonight at the Memorial Field the Junior Kinsmen and the Recce will clash in a scheduled game. Both teams have three wins to their credit, but the Kinsmen have played six games against the Recce's five.

Big Hank Sauer of the Cincinnati Reds, cracked out his 22nd home run the other night and stretched his lead over all rivals in this department with a total of 22 round-trippers. Prior to this season Sauer had been up in the big time twice, but he never could stay. Late in 1941 he came up from Birmingham to the Reds, but didn't last. He was first baseman then, but so was Frank McCormick and the latter was having a big season.

Bill McKechnie, then manager of the Reds, decided to make Sauer an outfielder. But he wasn't too good as a fielder and that kept him down even after he got out of the U.S. Coastguard. Sauer attributes his success to a change in the weight of the bats he uses. He's a 200-pounder and last year Enns got him to use a bigger war club.

"The difference between the bat I use now and the one I used to use is four ounces," says Sauer. "It's also an inch longer, 36 inches now. With the lighter bat I was getting around too quick. And I wasn't able to hit the outside pitch so good."

Now the Cincinnati slugger is welding a 40-ounce bat, and that rates as the heaviest piece of lumber in the entire National League.

**Ch'town All-Stars Defeat S'side 7-4 In Exhibition Tilt**

Charlottetown All-Stars came from behind yesterday to defeat Summerside All-Stars in an exhibition game at the Memorial Field diamond 7-4.

It was a free-hitting contest featuring many extra base blows. Lefty McAleer on the mound for the Charlottetownians allowed seven hits while Arsenault of Summerside, retired at the first of the eighth, allowed eight hits. Bernard, in a relief role, fared badly when two bingles, an error and a fielder's choice accounted for two runs and left no doubt as to the game's outcome.

A record-breaking crowd for the season sat in on the ball game. It proved an exciting and close encounter with the end in doubt until the eighth inning. The teams showed mid-season form with a total of only four errors showing in the box score. Summerside, last year's champions, drew three and Charlottetown one. Summerside errors proved costly, accounting for three runs.

Buck Whitlock with a triple and a double on four trips to the plate, led the Charlottetown offensive power while team-mate Art Perry cracked out three singles.

Summerside's heaviest hitter was big "Moose" Carson who poked out a double and a single in four times at bat.

Lefty McAleer had seven strikeouts to show for his afternoon's work, while Arsenault hand-cuffed four and Bernard one.
