SAYS OPIUM SALE ENCOURAGED BUT CECIL DENIES THIS

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Assertion that action taken by the League of Nations Assembly on the opium traffic was "intended to encourage the sale of large quantities" of the drug, was made by Chairman Porter of the House Foreign Affairs Committee in a letter published today by Lord Robert Cecil, leading British proponent of the League. Declining in his letter an appointment to discuss the activities of the League's opium commission, Mr. Porter took sharp issue with a statement in an article by Lord Robert that the League had "struck vigorous blows" at such world evils as the sale of opium and cocaine.
