TROUBLE AFLOAT—While a party of pleasure seekers were taking a motor boat trip up West River on Saturday afternoon, there was a break-down of the engine about a mile west of Westville. 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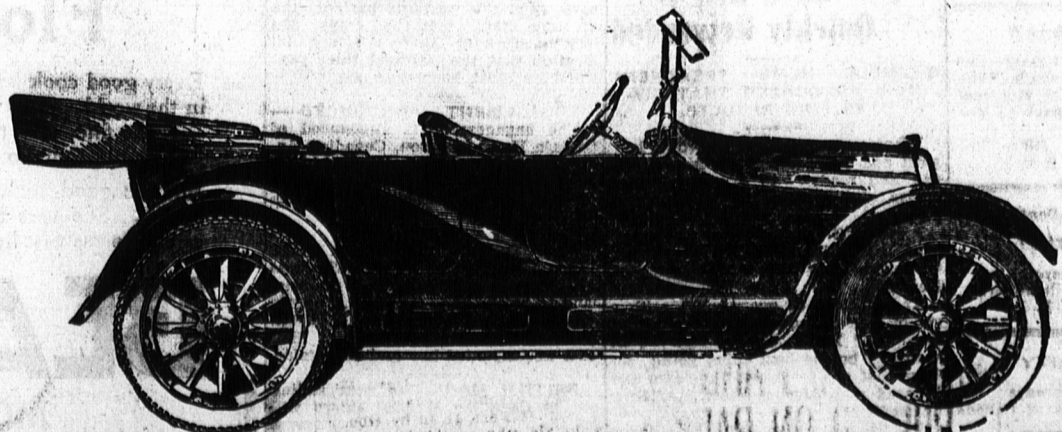
