In Memoriam

MICHAEL MCADAM

The death occurred in Brookline, Mass., on February 1st of Michael McAdam, a native of this province. Born in Port Augustus 75 years ago, he was removed to the United States when quite a young man where he has since resided.

For the past four years he has not enjoyed good health, his last illness proving fatal.

The late Mr. McAdam was twice married, both his wives having predeceased him.

Some few years ago his daughter Sadie of this city visited her father and planned to visit him again this summer. The news of his death came as a sad blow and bitter disappointment.

In addition to his daughter in this city three sons are left to mourn, Francis, Charles and Herbert, all residing in Brookline.

Also surviving is a sister, Mrs. Michael McCarey of this city, to all of whom the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

FRACTURES HIP — Mr. F. S. Wilkins, Divisional Engineer of the Canadian National Railways, Charlottetown, suffered a fractured hip in an accident at St. Peter's station yesterday morning. He lost his footing on the slippery platform and fell injuring the hip. However, it was not thought the injury was serious and Mr. Wilkins remained at St. Peter's all day awaiting until the train came back from Souris. He was taken to hospital, where he arrived here about six o'clock in the evening and conveyed by ambulance to the P. E. hospital. When he was examined in the hospital, it was discovered that his hip had been broken.

DIES OF INJURY — James Brigley, 22 years old, of Tutts Cove, died in the Victoria General hospital on Saturday morning, from injuries received some four or five hours earlier. He is believed to have been struck by an automobile on Windmill Road, Dartmouth. Dartmouth police charged Charles Lowe, of the town, with failing to stop at the scene of an accident. It is not known at the present time how long Brigley lay unconscious in the driveway of a residence on Windmill Road. He was called at 2:15 a. m. that took Dartmouth police to the scene. The police found Brigley unconscious and badly injured. Evidence on the snow and the street showed that the accident had occurred at a point further north, and that the car had been driven into the ditch along the road. He was rushed to the office of Dr. Hebb, Brigley died a few minutes after admission to hospital. In the meantime Dartmouth police found an abandoned car at the foot of Synnott's Hill. It was ditched and bloodstained. Charles Lowe, driver of the car, was contacted and questioned. Mr. Brigley is survived by three brothers in Dartmouth and Britain and Clifford in New York and a sister, Mrs. W. Gallant, Prince Edward Island. Funeral was held Tuesday—Halifax Chronicle.

After her graduation she taught for two years at Ontario Ladies College, Whitby, Ont., before taking a position in the Naval Department, Sydney, Nova Scotia. The groom is a son of Mr. and the late Mrs. E. F. Thorne, Halifax and is a recent graduate of Dalhousie Medical School. The bride was attractive in a street length gown of cream with wine colored redingote. She wore a corsage of tallman roses. The couple was unattended. During the register organ music was played by Toronto member of the C.W.A.A.F. After the ceremony a reception was held in a private dining room of the Royal York Hotel, Charlottetown people attending the wedding included Mrs. Harry Hill, mother of the bride, and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hill.

Exhibition Train Shows Army At Work

Canadians from coast to coast are at last going to find out what a "Jeep" is. Popeye had one idea and the Army has another. According to the latest unofficial Army vocabulary the light utility car seen in the centre of the flat car is a "Jeep". At left everyone will recognize a Universal Carrier and at right is an eight hundredweight Personnel Truck.

These vehicles form part of a comprehensive exhibition of the Canadian Army and its works now touring the Dominion from coast to coast. It will travel 15,000 miles and visit more than 200 centres from coast to coast.

One car is devoted to communications. Set up by the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals, the exhibit shows the channels of communication from units in the field to Divisional Headquarters.

These pictures show a sand bag shelter in which a unit wireless station has been set up. At centre is a model of an 8 cwt wireless truck and on the table a wireless set for use in vehicles.

Centre is the operator at D. H. Q., beyond him a Signal Sergeant demonstrates a cable-laying machine.

WHEAT FOR HORSES

The best single grain for horses is unquestionably oats, although, if necessary, wheat may be used in the ration, especially for work horses, states the Agricultural Supplies Board War-Time Series Pamphlet, No. 60 on "Wheat as a Feed for Live Stock". Wheat should be rolled or coarsely ground for horses and may be used with the greatest safety when fed in conjunction with a bulky feed like oats. The addition of wheat to the ration should be made gradually. A copy of this pamphlet may be obtained by writing to Publicity and Extension Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
