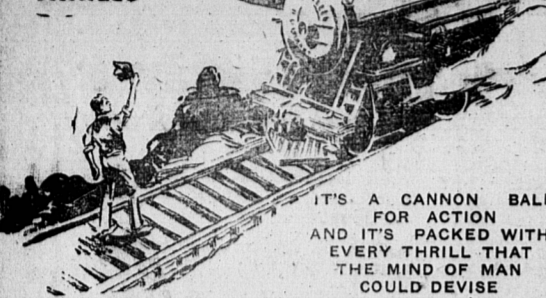

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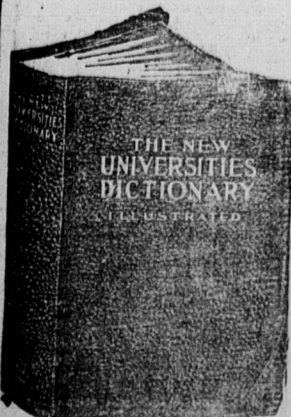

REGINA ACES WILL PLAY ALL-STAR ABE GWEIT TEAM HERE ON MONDAY NIGHT

McEachern, Williams, "Meb" Diamond And Gauthier Will Line Up With Old Team-Mates.-- Much Interest In Big Game.

Local hockey fans throughout the city and Island in general will learn with much satisfaction and no little elation the news that the Regina Aces, amateur hockey champions of Western Canada will play the Abegweit here at the local arena on Monday night.

The team is widely known throughout Canada as one of the smoothest working hockey machines to invade the East.

Although, only becoming familiar with the Eastern hockey rules, this team gave the champion Truro Bearcats one of the hardest games of their career last Wednesday night in the Halifax Forum.

The score is indicative of the play—Truro won, 3 goals to 1.

When one considers that nearly every man on the lineups has been offered tempting salaries to try pro, it surely looks as if they have a hang-up aggregation of puck chasers.

This is the first team in the history of hockey on Prince Edward Island that a team of this calibre has ever visited our shores. Therefore the fastest team possible that Charlottetown can muster will

be pitted against them. There are several reasons why Regina are being brought here to play a sextette picked from local color, mainly to show the Maritime hockey world that there is yet a good game left in the rank and file of the locals.

In all likelihood, the following team will face the Western Champions: Melvin Diamond, goal; "Chick" Williams, Hal Spillert, "Derk" Anderson, defence; "Whacker" McEachern, "Dempsey" Diamond, Earle Prowse, Hubert Saunders, Leo Gauthier, Frank Cox, forwards.

To look over the above mentioned aggregation is enough to satisfy the most sceptical that they will certainly give a good account of themselves, if not win from the fast and rugged tourists.

Upwards of five thousand spectators witnessed the Aces play the Bearcats in Halifax. The arena in this city does not, by any means measure up to this in seating capacity, but on this occasion it looks as if all records for hockey attendances will be smashed.

Ottawa Dispatch On Seized Liquor Called Camouflage

Writing to the Halifax Herald, the City Solicitor, Mr. F. H. Bell, shows up the fallacy of the Dominion Government's statement, and shows the unreasonableness of enforcing Prohibition.

SIR.—If one has a proper sense of humor one should be greatly amused over the announcement made by you that the "dry" fleet cruising in Maritime waters is to be greatly strengthened by the addition of seven new and expensive vessels at a cost of half a million dollars. To maintain the existing fleet cost last year nearly as much, and to maintain the additional fleet will probably cost as much more. The statement that the present fleet effected seizures of liquor to the duty paid value of \$850,000 is more camouflage, put in to create the impression among the unthinking that the fleet more than paid its way. The Government never got that sum or anything approaching it. It could only get any of it by selling the liquor to the Vendors Boards, and little or none of it goes that way. The most of it was the cheapest kind of Demerara rum costing not much more than fifty cents a gallon or one twentieth of the duty paid value

and a large part of it was destroyed.

THE AMUSING PART

That however, by the way, the amusing part of this situation is that all the moaning is being spent to protect ourselves against ourselves. The sole object of this glorious fleet is to stop liquor from coming into the country. Down this way at any rate there is no other kind of smuggling worth mention. The reason for so great an amount of smuggling of this particular commodity is because there is so great a demand for it, and there is no other way of obtaining it. People want it and mean to have it. If it were not so there would be no smugglers and no bootleggers. No one is forced to buy liquor. People would much prefer to get the liquor legally and at a moderate price. But if they can't get it that way when they intend to get it the other way. They may vote dry but they drink wet, and intend to do so. So this is the situation: First, at the instance of an intolerant and well organized minority, we pass laws to stop ourselves from obtaining liquor—Next, by our demand for it bring into existence a huge and well organized force of smugglers and bootleggers to supply us with what we have just passed a law to stop ourselves from procuring. Then finally we pay some millions of dollars for a huge force of ships and men to stop ourselves from getting the stuff we are determined to have. As my friend W. P. B. says, "Can you beat it?"

ITEMS OF NEWS

Let me take this opportunity of calling attention to two recent items of news: One is the statement of Inspector McRae, of Sydney, that notwithstanding the strenuous activities of the dry forces in that city during the past year, the number of illicit drinking places has greatly increased. The second is the address recently delivered by a Catholic clergyman in Glace Bay, wherein he particularly deplored the "appalling" (I think that was the word) appetite for intoxicating liquor which was being acquired by the young people in his parish. I particularly commend this last statement to the consideration of those persons who maintain that no matter how ineffective prohibition may be in reforming those who have acquired a taste for intoxicants it is worth all its attendant evils to produce a "generation unacquainted with the taste of liquor."

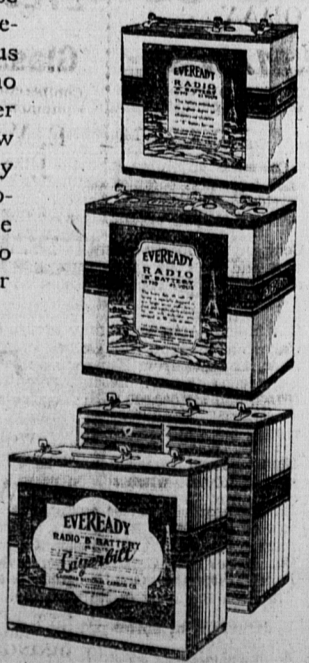


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
