#### Former Truro Man Sells Famous Cow For Sum of \$15,000

A recent issue of the Vancouver Daily Province says: "All records for prices in purebred stock in British Columbia or Western Canada were beaten on Saturday when Zarilda Clothilde, a Holstein cow, famous Holstein cow on the Colony Farm and her one-month old heifer calf were sold to John A. Bell, a well-known breeder at Cornopolis, Penn., for the sum of \$15,000.

"Mr. Bell will visit the farm in a few days and will personally supervise the transfer of the Holstein aristocrats to his Pennsylvania farm. The sale was made by Mr. 'Pete' Moore, manager of Colony Farm, who is now in the East. "Zarilda has for years been looked upon as the last word in Holstein in Western Canada. A few years ago she broke the world's record for milk and butter, producing more than 33,000 pounds of milk and more than 1100 pounds of butter. Recently she broke this record and came within a few pounds of the famous Holstein world's record, which was won by a California cow. Zarilda's record on this occasion, the year 1919, was 33,153 pounds of milk and 1194 pounds of butter. Her best record for three years production averaged more than 31,000 pounds of milk and more than 1000 pounds of butter.

"The cow was purchased by the Colony Farm in New York state nine years ago when one year old." "The Mr. Moore referred to above is Percy H. Moore, son of S. J. Moore, Truro, who formerly lived in the Shubenacadie district where he conducted dairying operations successfully with a high grade of Guernseys. He was also a breeder of Oxford Down sheep and a prominent exhibitor at the Halifax exhibition.

Under the head "Three cheers and a Tiger for Percy H. Moore and His Famous Cow" the Maritime Farmer says: "It is only quite natural that a live young man brought up in an environment of this kind should early in life follow up the practical teachings and ideas gleaned on his father's farm by taking the opportunity of a two-year course at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and rounding out his B. S. A. degree at the Ontario Agricultural College. This was the course pursued by Percy H. Moore, one of Mr. Moore's sons, who not only made an enviable record for himself in his college career but has also made good in his chosen vocation since leaving college.

"After graduating he was for a time connected with one of the United States departments of agriculture from which position he received a call to become dairy commissioner for British Columbia. His next call was to superintend the Dominion experimental farm at Agassiz, B. C. From Agassiz he went to take charge of the Colony Farm at Essondale, B. C., where he is still in charge."

#### The Interests of Maritime Provinces

HALIFAX, March 23.—In the House of Assembly today Mr. Torrey, the member for Guysboro gave notice of a resolution calling for a conference of representatives of the governments of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island to insist upon the rights of the Maritime Provinces which he claims have been neglected by the Federal Government, through their policy of Western preference. Among the questions to be considered will be compensation to the Maritime Provinces for Western school lands; for subsidies to the Province of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and for territory annexed to the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

#### American Marines Killed Two Chinese

TOKIO, March 25.—American marines who landed at Kiuikiang at the request of the British Consul, killed two Chinese coolies, according to reports here. They later withdrew at the request of the local authorities.

#### Outlook in Ireland Is Serious

LONDON, March 24.—The Dublin correspondent of the London Times describes the situation in Ireland in darkest colors. He says

the outlook is serious. Conditions in the west and south are extremely grave. The position, bad last week, is now definitely worse. Public feeling is so fiercely inflamed as to become quite irrational. The most outrageous charges against the Government are accepted as gospel truth. The correspondent says the Sinn Fein asks the country to accept the monstrous theory that Lord Mayor Mac Curtain was killed by actual agents of the Government. He describes the overnight riot in Dublin as another danger signal, and says it is impossible to get an impartial account of the incident, the popular version being that the soldiers provoked and assaulted civilians. The correspondent learns that the soldiers were stoned by a crowd because they left the theatre singing the national anthem as a protest against the failure of the theatre orchestra to play it. He adds that public opinion throughout the country is exasperated by a wild charge against the police and soldiers who hardly would be human if they did not resent the campaign of murder and calumny.
