### British Labor Party Behind New Premier

BOURNEMOUTH, May 13—(CP)—The Labor Party today ranged itself solidly with Winston Churchill's National Government, taking its "responsibility as a full partner" in the drive for "a swift victory and a just peace." The party, at its national conference adopted by an overwhelming majority a resolution sponsored by Clement Attlee, its parliamentary leader, and Arthur Greenwood, the deputy leader, who have entered the war cabinet. Mr. Attlee as Lord Privy Seal and Mr. Greenwood as minister without portfolio. The card vote was 2,413,000 to 170,000. The vote of roughly 15 to 1 was not unexpected as the general council of the Trades Union Congress, the national executive of the Labor Party and the executive committee of the parliamentary Labor Party had all endorsed acceptance by Labor of Government posts.

By accepting its full measure of responsibility in the Government, proudly saw its men take posts vital to successful prosecution of the war. In addition to Mr. Attlee and Mr. Greenwood, these posts had gone to Labor up to tonight:—Admiral A. V. Alexander. Supply, Herbert Morrison.

### France Recalls Athlone's Work In 1914-18 War

PARIS, May 13—(CP)—French writers are recalling with pleasure and commendation the associations of the Earl of Athlone, governor-general designate of Canada, with France and the French troops in the First Great War.

Leon de Laperouse writes of the new Governor-General in the warmest terms, recalling that 26 years ago Count Athlone was once before appointed to that high post but when the war intervened and he, as a staff officer, joined the British troops in France.

The Earl came in contact with the French forces when British, French and Belgian troops fought in one of the stiffest periods of the war, in October and November 1914, and stopped the Germans on the banks of the Yser River in northern France and Belgium.

"If he is Count Athlone to the world, brother of the queen Mother of England and uncle of his Majesty King George VI, he was for us the young captain of the British army who was at our side in the tragic days of the Yser," writes de Laperouse. "He remains in the memories of the survivors of that heroic brigade. He was a charming and much liked comrade of the French officers."
