Will Evacuate Cologne Area December 1st

(Canadian Press) PARIS, Nov. 16.—The Cologne area will be evacuated December 1. The allied Council of the Ambassadors have decided officially the council having been satisfied by the explanations given by Germany in her latest disarmament note.

Live Stock Markets

(Canadian Press.)

MONTREAL, Nov. 16.—Dominion live stock report. Cattle receipts, 1,488. With a lighter offering of cattle and practically all medium and common quality, trading was steady and prices on some lots of common and medium butcher cattle appeared a shade higher. There were no steers good enough to sell above six-seventy-five and the best were picked out for export. Medium steers sold from five-twenty to six dollars and common ones four thirty-five to five dollars. A few good heifers reached six dollars and medium ones brought four twenty-five to five twenty-five.

Several lots of light steers, medium heifers, and cows sold together from four to four fifty and good cows ranged from four fifty to five dollars. Canners and cutters were in good demand at two dollars for the canners and up to two seventy-five for the cutters. There were no good bulls. Common bogans brought from three to three fifty.

Butcher steers, good \$6.25 to \$6.75; medium \$5.25 to \$6.00; common \$4.25 to \$5.00; butcher heifers, good \$5.50 to \$6.00; medium \$4.50 to \$5.25; common \$3.50 to \$4.25; butcher cows, good \$4.50 to \$5.00; medium \$3.00 to \$3.50. Calf receipts 92.

The good veals were picked out at eleven dollars and eleven fifty and common lots sold from nine to ten fifty. Grassers were in slightly better demand and brought four twenty-five to four seventy-five and heavy fall fed calves mostly six to eight dollars. Quotations, good veal \$10.50 to \$11.50, medium \$9.00 to \$10.00, common \$6.00 to \$8.00; grassers \$4.25 to \$4.75. Sheep receipts 4,192.

Quality considered lamb prices were about steady. Good lambs brought twelve dollars, medium lots eleven seventy-five and common ones eleven to eleven fifty. The bulk of the lambs were heavy bucks and most of these were thin in flesh. Sheep sold from four to four and a half was the ruling price for odd lots of good quality although a few early sales were made on one man lamb, good \$11.75 to \$12.00, common \$11.45 to \$11.50; hog receipts 2,085. Hogs were higher. Thirteen dollars and fifty.

Negro Slayer Gets Death Sentence

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 16.—Johnny Washington, negro slayer, the "man whom the law forgot," will go to his death in the electric chair next Friday. Clemency was denied him yesterday afternoon when his case gained prominence some time ago when the state forgot his execution date. The negro, pacing the death cell, of McAlester Prison, found an unexpected stay of execution. Meanwhile the courts got into action again and re-sentenced him to die. He had been convicted of murdering an El Dorado town marshal who surprised him in the act of committing a robbery.

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
