Charles Clarke, a member of the cruiser Canada's crew, is a pretty good swimmer who he is self admitted thief. He entered a plea of guilty yesterday in the police court to a charge of having stolen money from a shipmate on the cruiser. He said he stole \$24, not 49 as alleged in the information. Clarke is a young seaman hailing from Cornwall, Ontario, who was on the Canada when she was in the bay. He decided to get away from the ship. He first helped himself to what he could find in a shipmate's box. He took \$24 in loose cash together with other articles. Part of these he threw overboard, but he kept the rest. He was dark and the crew did not know probably being thrown away together with some other envelopes containing letters. Clarke then jumped over the side of the vessel, having first fastened a lifeboat around his body. A dress suit case in which he had some belongings, his own and those of others, were placed under his hands. He propelled himself with his feet for more than three quarters of a mile when he boarded a schooner. Those on the cruiser heard a splash and lowered a boat. As it was dark and the morning, it was carried on with difficulty. Clarke was taken from the vessel and returned to the cruiser. When she arrived here Saturday afternoon Detective Kennedy arrested him. Yesterday he pleaded guilty and was remanded till Monday for sentence. He is known here and left this port but recently.

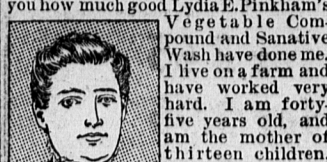

CHOLERA EPIDEMIC SPREADING IN ITALY. WASHINGTON, Aug. 7—The epidemic of cholera in Italy is spreading. It is extending to Genova and Leghorn, according to advices received today by Surgeon General Wyman of the public health marine hospital service. During the period from July 22 to 26, there were sixty-eight cases of cholera in Naples, with twenty deaths. In Naples province there were 148 cases and seventy-five deaths. Throughout the remainder of continental Italy there were 139 cases and fifty-one deaths. In Palermo there were 109 cases, thirty-two of which were fatal, and in Palermo province seventy-five deaths.

SIX HORSES BURNED TO DEATH IN \$20,000 MONTREAL FIRE. LOST HIS LIFE IN ATTEMPT TO HELP BROOKED CASHIER.

MONTREAL, Aug. 7—Damage to the extent of \$20,000, was done by a fire which broke out in the Montreal Funeral Expense Society tonight. Six horses were burned to death and a number of carriages, a large quantity of hay and all the furniture were totally destroyed.

The house of George Smith, adjoining, was also consumed. Fireman Charette and Firemen Brian were hurt, the former being struck on the head by falling beams and having his eye injured by fire. Brian was also burned about the back and shoulders.
