## CH'TOWN DRIVING PARK AND EXHIBITION

### Annual Meeting Of Provincial Association Held Yesterday—Dates Selected For This Year August 21st To 25th.

The Annual Meeting of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association, Ltd., was held in the offices of the company, Tweel Building, yesterday afternoon. President James Paton in the chair and a full attendance of Directors present. The President read the following report which was adopted.

### Directors Report

The Directors take pleasure in submitting their annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1932, and hope that the shareholders, exhibitors and general public will be pleased with it. Early in the year it seemed that the idea of holding an Exhibition was impractical. The Federal grant had been discontinued and the City of Charlottetown grant reduced one half. However, on vigorous representations being made to the Federal Government a grant of one half the former amount was given and this together with the usual grant from the Provincial Government and the strong support voiced by a large number of the prominent exhibitors, merchants of Charlottetown and others, made us decide to go ahead with our Fair. ## Famous Airman Believed Dead

LONDON, Jan. 11.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Lost to the world for five full days, Bert Hinkler, famous Australian airman, tonight was presumed to be dead.

Preparation were made to send a search party out after Hinkler, who left Feltham, England, on the long flight to Australia before dawn on Saturday. But the organizers were pessimistic. They had no clue as to where the search could start. Even Hinkler's definite route was not known.

## 4,300 Pelts Offered At Special Sale

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 11.—A special fox sale by the Canadian Fur Auction Sales Co., Ltd., ended today with 4,300 silver fox pelts offered. A top price of \$125 was received with an average of \$28.35 for the day's offerings. Since Monday the sale had been well attended by Canadian, United States and European buyers.

In all there were 11,397 silver fox skins offered during the three days with 80 per cent of that number sold at an average price of \$29.33, a decline of six per cent from the December sale. Offerings did not average up to the quality of those auctioned in the last sale. Prices today were as follows: Selected 1/2 to 3/4 silvers, \$58.82; 1/2 to 3/4 silvers, \$34.94; selected all silvers, \$51.07; all silvers, \$34.75; black, \$20.43; inferior and low grades, \$19.07. The average prices for the three days were: Selected 1/2 to 3/4 silvers, \$59.50; 1/2 to 3/4 silvers, \$34.79; 3/4 silver, \$24.34; black, \$20.44; inferior types and low grades, \$20.38.

## Chinese Army Put To Flight

### Japanese Now In Complete Control Of Chiumenkow—Invaders Do Not Intend To Proceed Into China

(Associated Press) PEIPING, China, Jan. 11.—The Japanese Legation announced tonight that the Japanese army is in complete control of Chiumenkow, a pass through the Great Wall of China about 14 miles north of Shanhai-kwan. Chinese defenders of the pass, who resisted the attack all yesterday, have been put to flight, the Legation declared.

Foreign military observers in Peiping did not attach great significance to the seizure of the pass, asserting that there were many others which will make it possible for Chang Hsiao-Liang, Chinese commander, to maintain contact with the Province of Jehol, north of the wall. The Japanese do not intend to proceed into China.

## FEATURES OF NEW HOSPITAL EXPLAINED

### Mr. James Govan, Architect, Toronto, In Address Explained Some Unique Qualities Of The New Building.

"Unique features of the new hospital building" were discussed by Mr. James Govan, M.R.A.I.C., of Govan and Ferguson, Architects and Associate Engineers in an address at a meeting of the Ladies' Aid to the P. E. I. Hospital yesterday. The speaker referred to the recently published final report of the United States Committee on the Costs of Medical Care, and also to an article on "Dollars, Doctors and Disease." In the current issue of Atlantic Monthly, both of which deal with the need of widening the scope of medical care of all classes of society at a cost that will ensure the essential services for everybody and at the same time provide adequate and assured payment to the individuals and agencies which furnish the care.

## FALCONWOOD PLANS HAVE BEEN APPROVED

### Five Units Are Called For. Building Will Be Fire-Proof And Modern In Every Detail.

Plans drafted for the new Falconwood Hospital have been approved and it is understood that tenders for its construction will be called in about a week's time. Mr. C. A. Fowler, Halifax, is the architect. The work will probably begin some time in the Spring. The plans call for five units, a main building in which accommodation will be provided for 185 patients, two convalescent homes in each of which accommodation will be provided for 75 patients, the last wing which is to be repaired, and a doctor's residence. The buildings are to be steel framed and of fire-proof construction and modern in every detail. The building material to be used is brick. The floors will be cement.

## Pension Sought For Widow Of Late President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(A.P.)—A pension of \$5,000 yearly for Grace Goodhue Coolidge, widow of the late former President of the United States was sought today in a bill introduced by Senator Warren R. Austin, Vermont, Republican. Congress usually votes pensions to the widows of former Presidents.

## Egg And Poultry Association Had Successful Year

### Nearly A Million Dozen Eggs And A Quarter Million Pounds Dressed Poultry Handled By Cooperative Organization. 13 Per Cent Bonus Declared On Value Of Eggs Shipped During Year.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the P. E. I. Co-operative Egg and Poultry Association held in the Agricultural Hall yesterday afternoon a bonus of 13 per cent was declared on the value of the eggs shipped by the members during 1932. The bonus checks will be sent to all affiliated Egg Circles as soon as their business statements are checked with the book at the head office at Charlottetown. During the past year nearly a million dozens of eggs and about a quarter million pounds of dressed poultry was handled by the Association. The association will continue to handle all dressed poultry that the members wish to market until the last of February; eggs are handled every week in the year. Mr. J. R. Munn, president and the manager Mr. Geo. Leightizer are being congratulated on the splendid showing of the Association during the past year, a year that has severely tested the business ability of any executives. Complete details and reports will be submitted to the Delegates at the Annual meeting of the Association during Farmer's Week, which will take place early in March.

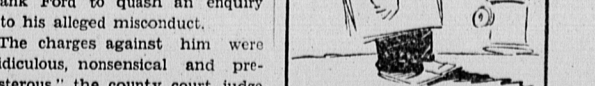
