CREDIT TO ISLAND WORKMANSHIP.—Referring to the recent launch at the McNeill Shipyard, New Glasgow, N.S., of the schooner Annabel, the Evening News said: Just as she entered the water the anchors were dropped and the ship glided down the river for about fifty yards—a pretty sight, and a credit to the workmanship of master-builders, Mr. D.S. McLaren, of Cardigan, P. E. I., who, by the way, is one of the most competent shipbuilders in Eastern Canada. The caulking of this splendid vessel was done under the direction of Mr. Wm. Haberlin, of Georgetown, P. E. I., while the spars were made by Captain O. W. Gosbee, of Murray River, P. E. I., so it can be seen that the Annabel is to a very large extent the production of Island brawn and brains. She is owned by Mr. Charles McNeill, New Glasgow. The newly launched vessel has a keel of 145 feet, 33 feet beam and her hold is 13 feet. Her tonnage is five hundred tons. She is fully rigged excepting for the sails and is as trim looking a craft as ever graced the waters of the East River.

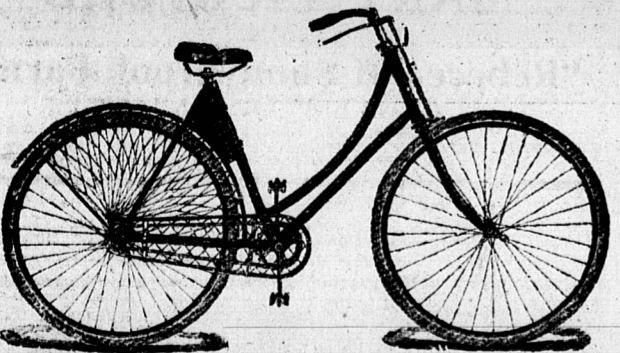
CRAPAUD.—Mr. John Lea, Victoria, has sold a part of the Crawford farm to Mr. Smith, of Victoria. The land was very valuable, fetching about \$70 an acre. A surveyor, Mr. John Alfred Macdonald, Hermanville, was surveying a portion of this property during the week, as well as other properties in the neighborhood. Crapaud farm property is possibly the highest priced farm lands in the province. The Myers property, less than a hundred acres, sold recently for \$7,000, while Mr. Fred W. McDonald and Joseph Trowsdale paid almost as much for the old Smith farm. Farm land around Crapaud and Victoria ranges from sixty to eighty dollars per acre. Land values are going up rapidly. Now is apparently the time to buy. The Humphrey farm at Tryon was also recently sold at a high figure, sixty acres going to Mr. Maybee, and one hundred to Mr. S. Canfield. Since purchasing, Mr. Maybee has had two offers for his part of this property at as much as twenty-five per cent. above the purchase price.—The farmers around Crapaud are not much opposed to the auto for the good reason that a large number of them own and drive autos. There are fully a dozen autos in Crapaud and Victoria owned by farmers. The mail driver drives an auto; in fact, Mr. Watton uses two, and sometimes three, on his mail and passenger route from Crapaud to Bradabane; and it is no low-priced cars the farmers own, either, but McLaughlins and other high-priced cars.
