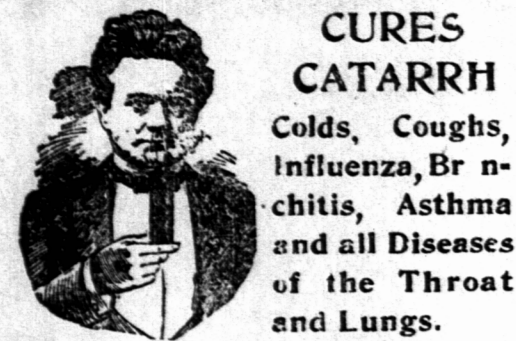

Newfoundland with a surplus of a quarter million this year is expected to make some tariff reductions, increase the grant for education and reduce letter postage to two cents.

The London Graphic tells that the great industrial towns of England are clamoring for "business men" to conduct their public affairs. This is a pointer for Charlottetown and West Queens.

Dr. Joseph Oldfield, author of a book on the death penalty, says he wrote to all the Bishops of the Church of England on the subject and not one of them favored the abolition of capital punishment. The feeling of the English bishops is largely shared by the people of the British Isles and the Empire generally.

There are some big city debts in the United States, the biggest being that of New York, over 300 millions. Chicago's debt is over 26 millions; Baltimore owes \$1 millions; Boston 56 millions and Philadelphia 43 millions. In most cases a very large share of the debts have been rolled up within the ten years past. Within five years New York has added 186 millions to her indebtedness.

British Columbia, which gets no fishery bounties out of the Halifax award, is impatient to take over the coast fisheries there under the decision of the Privy Council. At the session of the Legislature just now closed an act was passed authorizing the Provincial Government to assume complete control of the fisheries and a despatch from Victoria says it is expected that a proclamation will be immediately issued to bring the act into force.

Omitting the original 72 Senators with which the Dominion started there were 26 appointments made to the Senate during all the years that Sir John Macdonald was Premier. During the earlier years of the Dominion when most of the Senators were still in active life the vacancies were comparatively few. Recently death and other causes have produced many vacancies. More appointments to the Senate have been made in the five years 1896-1901 than were made in the twelve years 1879-91. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has already appointed 23 Senators during his comparatively brief term of office.

Canada has an interest in the coming selection of Chairman for the Committee on Foreign Relations at Washington. There are two candidates well at the front in running, Senator Cullom and Senator Lodge. The latter is opposed to reciprocity with Canada in any form while Senator Cullom is quite favorable to reciprocity. The President and Cabinet are understood to favor reciprocity, but Cabinet influence by no means dominates the Congress at Washington as it does the Canadian Parliament. It is confidently expected that the reciprocity question will come up and be disposed of in some way at the meeting of Congress next winter.

In the matter of the tax on commercial travellers in P. E. Island we learn that the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Association has been actively engaged to bring about its repeal. The head-quarters of the Association is in Montreal, and when the question of increased subsidy to the Island came up in Parliament all the Montreal as well as the Toronto members of the Commons were written to, urging that the abrogation of the travellers' tax be made a condition precedent to the granting of the increased subsidy. One of the members of the Commons thus addressed informed the Secretary of the Travellers' Association that "he had every reason to believe the tax will be done away in the near future." The travellers announce their intention to "keep pounding away" until that object is effected.

Mr. George Wheatley and Dr. Kelly are nominated as candidates for the vacancy in Ward Five. It would please a large number of the electors of the Ward if the candidates would make public their views and attitude with respect to the prohibitory law now coming into operation. Although the enforcement of the law will not rest primarily with the City Council, it is felt that the Council by its control of the police and otherwise may be a considerable factor in strengthening or weakening the enforcement of the law. Electors will know better how to vote if the candidates will make their position clear in that regard.

There are three different rates of royalty on coal in force in Nova Scotia. The Dominion Coal Company pay a royalty of 12 1/2 cents a ton on their production. But on so much as they supply to the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, which may reach a million tons yearly, the royalty will be but six and a quarter cents per ton. The independent coal companies continue to pay 10 cents per ton as they did before the Dominion Company acquired the Cape Breton mines. Last year coal royalties were paid on a little less than 3,000,000 tons, giving to the provincial revenue \$353,102. It is thought that this year the output will reach 4,000,000 tons, with a corresponding increase in the total royalties.
