A STUDY OF CANCER.

The announcement was made not long ago that Dr. Gaylord of the State Laboratory of Buffalo had discovered the micro-organism which is the cause of cancer. If true, nothing could well exceed the importance of the discovery, as we might then expect that the discovery of an effectual antitoxin or remedy of some sort would follow. No other disease is so much dreaded, and it is a painful fact that it is steadily increasing its ravages in almost every civilized country.

Apart from this the laboratory of Buffalo has collected some curious statistics bearing upon this malignant malady. For instance in the years from 1880 to 1890 the death-rate from cancer increased from 35 to 53 per 100,000. This is an alarming rate of increase for nineteen years, although the larger figures are but one-fifth to one-fourth of the total death-rate from all causes.

But a more curious feature of the statistics is found in the fact that in Buffalo 42 per cent of the deaths from cancer were among the Germans and Poles, who constitute only 20 per cent of the population, while only 29 per cent of the cancer mortality was among native-born Americans, who make up 65 per cent of the total population of the City. The statistics show, further, that cancer of the stomach is more than twice as frequent among the Germans and Poles in Buffalo as among the native-born. These facts would go to show that diet is probably a factor producing or developing this malady.

The German is a beer drinker notoriously, and a large but leisurely eater. It can hardly be established that in the matter of eating the German abuses his stomach so much as the American, who often eats in haste, bolts his food, and suffers from dyspepsia in consequence. But cancer has not followed in the wake of dyspepsia. Two Americans have dyspepsia to every one German in a population equally divided between the two races. It may yet be found that the germs of the disease are frequently carried into the system by some articles of drink or food which Germans use more largely than others.

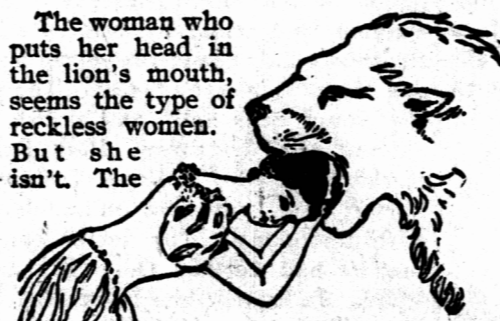
If we seek for articles which the German people in America distinctly use more largely than other peoples the first thought will be of beer among drinks and cabbage among vegetable foods. It is notorious that the use of malt liquors, always large in Germany, has extended enormously in England and the United States within the past twenty years. The extension of beer drinking has been coincident with the rapid increase of cancer. It does not necessarily follow from this that the drink is the cause of the disease, but the fact appears clear that in Buffalo

the beer drinking, cabbage-eating German is more afflicted with cancer than men of other races.

Montreal last year had a revenue of \$3,157,614, of which \$2,871,277 was derived from taxes. The balance came from various sources, the city's share of the street railway's earnings being the largest single item. The railway paid the city \$77,880.

Mr. H. Bence-Jones, of the Royal Statistical Society has published in the journals of the Society for 1900 the statement that the consumption of intoxicating liquors in Canada is smaller per head than in any other country for which statistics exist. All of it is creditable to Canada. And P. E. Island is the one Province of the Dominion in which the consumption is smallest.

It was not generally suspected that in 1895 France and Germany were on the verge of war, but an incident recently described in the London Times Brussels correspondence makes it now apparent that such was the case. The Times describes how a member of the Chamber of Representatives, M. Woeste, asked the Minister of Foreign Affairs if the Belgian government had not, in the year 1895 received a secret warning to prepare her frontiers, garrisons and fortresses to meet the contingency of a war between France and Germany which was at the time deemed inevitable. The Minister, M. de Favereau, replying to this very pointed question, said that in the interest of friendly international relations he must decline to make any specific answer, and must refuse to publish the diplomatic correspondence with either of the powers mentioned, but he added this significant remark: "The chamber will understand my reserve; and I am not a little astonished at the honorable member's persistence."

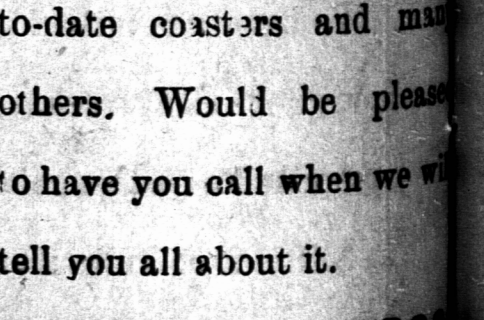
