**Hohenzollerns Behind Nazis?**

BERLIN, Nov. 22—The House of Hohenzollern was said today by one of its members, Prince August Wilhelm, fourth son of the former Kaiser, to be solidly behind the Nazi regime.

The Prince, who made this statement to foreign correspondents, is the only Hohenzollern prominent in Nazi party affairs. He works in a Potsdam wartime food supply office.

"Immediately after the Munich incident on Nov. 8 my father telephoned from Doorn to the German minister at the Hague to express his gratitude that the Fuehrer escaped," said the Prince.

"My entire house is absolutely against all efforts to injure Germany. And whatever is against the Fuehrer is against Germany. It is unbelievable that anyone in my house or another German royal house could do anything against the Fuehrer or the regime. We were as shocked by Munich as everyone else."

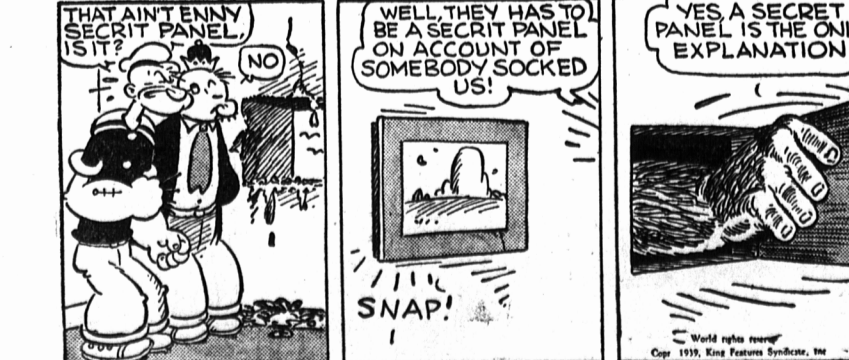
