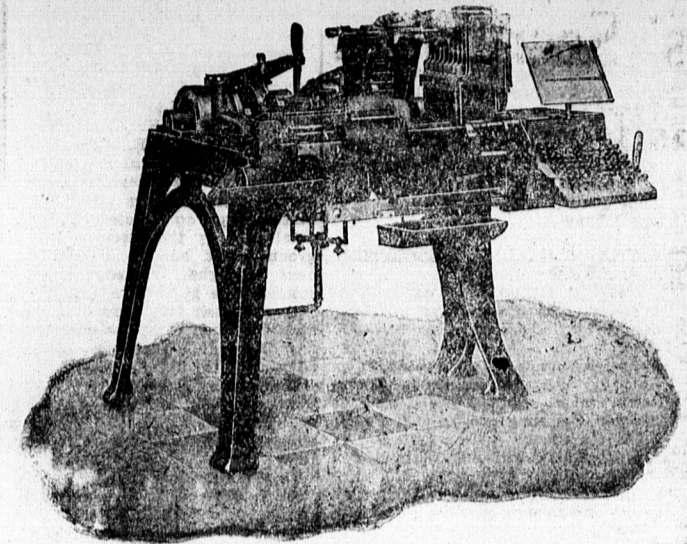


# EVERYBODY IS INVITED TO CALL AT THE GUARDIAN OFFICES TODAY
