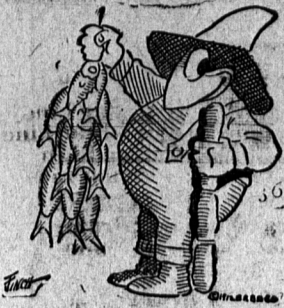

BRITISH NATIONALITY BILL DISCUSSED

(Continued from page one)

The other four years may have been passed in any other portion of the Empire.

The Bill also stiffens the Naturalization Law in that it provides that before an Alien can be naturalized he must have an adequate knowledge of either English or French. It further provides in this same connection that the courts have the power to require satisfactory proof of the proper qualification of the applicant for naturalization. This proof to be forwarded to the Secretary of State who has to issue the certificate.

Sir Wilfred Laurier congratulated Mr. Doherty upon achieving a solution of a problem which had long engaged the attention of British and Overseas Statesmen. He had however one or two suggestions to make in respect to the provisions of the various clauses being especially emphatic in his objection to the clause which gave discretionary power to the Secretary of State. The Bill was given its second reading, taken up in committee and stood over. It is probable that it will be slightly amended but its frame work will not be affected.

During the day Hon. Rogers' Bill to amend the Dry Dock Subsidies Act was given a third reading. Hon. William Pugsley, W. S. Middleboro and W. F. Carrol of Sydney urged upon the Minister of Public Works the desirability of giving all docks hereafter built a four per cent subsidy instead of three and a half per cent. The Minister promised to look into the question during this summer.

The Bill to amend the National Battlefields Commission Act was passed.

The Bill to Incorporate the Canadian General Council of the Boy Scouts Association was also passed as were several divorce Bills.

INTER-MARITIME RIFLE MEETING

There was a meeting of the P. E. Island Rifle Association on Friday night, when the annual business meeting was fixed to take place on June 22.

The Inter-Maritime match will be shot here on Thursday, June 11, between eight selected men from New Brunswick, eight from Nova Scotia and eight representing Prince Edward Island. It is the blue ribbon shoot of the lower provinces and, indeed, one of the most important shoots in the Dominion of Canada. A committee was appointed to select the Island team. The committee consists of Major Weeks, Major Jones and Captain MacKinnon, who will have full control of not only the selector of the team but the general management of the match. An entertainment committee was appointed of Major Allan, Chairman, Lieutenant W. K. Rogers, Lieutenant G. M. Moore, Lieutenant J. A. S. Bayer and Captain J. W. Stanley.

The following are the revised regulations under which the Inter-Maritime match will in future be shot.

1. The match will be an annual one, between teams of eight representatives of the Rifle Association of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Teams shall be composed solely of bona fide members of the Non Permanent Active Militia of the province that they represent.

RANGES, ETC., as in the "Governor General's" (first stage) number of shots seven, with two sighting shots at each range. Sighting shots must be fired. The regulations of the "Governor General's" match of the preceding year will govern all conditions as to rifles, position, target, scoring, etc.

UNIFORMS: Drill order (without belt) or Clean Fatigue. COACHING will be allowed. AMMUNITION: Teams will provide their own ammunition.

DATE: The match will be shot on the second Thursday in June of each year.

PLACE: The match will be shot, in annual rotation, at Halifax, Charlottetown and St. John.

Each team shall be under the control of a captain appointed by his Association, and the competition shall be held under the joint consent of the three captains. Each team may also employ an Adjutant to assist in coaching. The Captain may or may not be a member of the team.

Each team shall pay an annual entrance fee of \$10, which shall be used to procure badges or tokens for members of the winning team. The range expenses in connection with the match will be assumed by the team from the province in which the match is shot.

AROUND THE FUR RANCHES

More good news comes from the ranches. The North American Ranch, Montague, reports three litters, one of six, one of five and one of four pups.

On the ranch of the Charlottetown Silver Fox Company, there are eight litters, containing twenty-eight pups which are all on foot. This result is all the more pleasing from the fact that the foxes that bred these litters were themselves all pups last year, and it is to be hoped that where there has evidently been such good management in the care of the foxes that the young families will be raised without any loss.

The Imperial Company reports from its ranch an increase of eleven pups from its four and a half pairs of breeders. These pups are all on foot.

The branch office which the Royal Investment Exchange of this city has just opened in Montreal makes the fourth of the kind that has been established by this progressive organization since it began business at the beginning of this year; the other three being situated in London, England; Halifax, N. S.; and Cambridge, Mass.; and as a large portion of the Exchange's business is "foxes," this is a healthy sign in regard to the expansion of this business. While no doubt the establishment of these branches was impelled by the necessity that the business opportunities created, it speaks volumes for the confidence the Exchange has in the stability of the fox business and its great development. The Montreal branch was an absolute necessity in consequence of the business offering, and it is situated in the New Birk's building.

A revised issue of the booklet published by the Provincial Secretary's Department, giving the fox and other fur farming companies at present operating in this Island, is now being distributed. The new edition covers the period up to May 7th, the full list being given of the fox and other fur companies incorporated in this Island at that date and, in addition, those companies which though not incorporated here are yet ranching in the Island. The list is alphabetically arranged and shows the titles of the companies, the amounts of their authorized capitalization and the locations of their head offices. Also it shows in regard to the locally incorporated companies how they were incorporated—whether by Letters Patent or by special Acts of the Legislature. In regard to the extra-provincial com-



panies, the booklet states either the local managers or agents or directors thereof. In cases where the capital stock of the companies has been increased since incorporation this is also indicated. This comprehensive scope of its information renders the publication of exceeding value. Further, lest there should be any doubt as to the authenticity of the information contained in this publication, the present issue bears the stamp of officialdom—the Royal Arms, and the statement that it is issued by the Department of the Provincial Secretary of P. E. I. and, is further signed by the Provincial Secretary, Mr. Arthur Newbury. This publication shows that up to May 7th there were no fewer than 196 companies incorporated in this Island, with a total of capitalization of \$24,305,700. Then there were seven companies incorporated abroad but working here, whose total capitalization amounted to \$4,325,000, making a grand total of 203 companies with a capitalization of \$28,630,700. The following note in the booklet shows that in the above figures the full extent of the fox industry of the Island is not covered. "In addition to the above, there are also numerous fox ranches in this province owned by companies not incorporated and by firms and private individuals, the total valuation of which is not yet definitely known by this department."

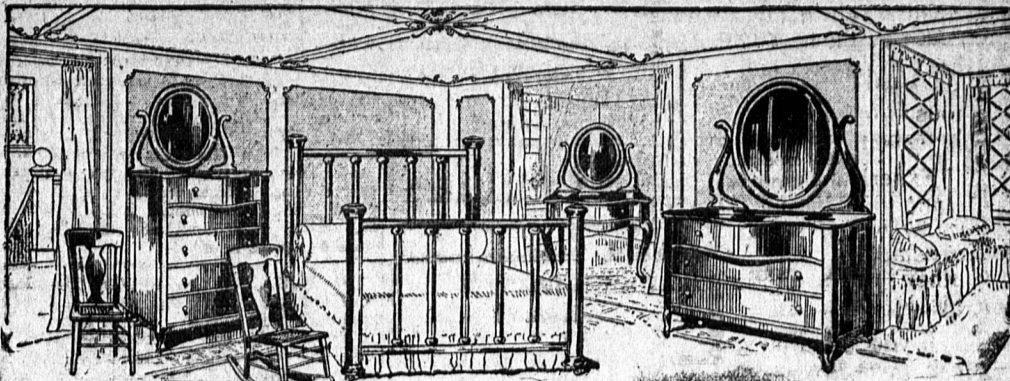

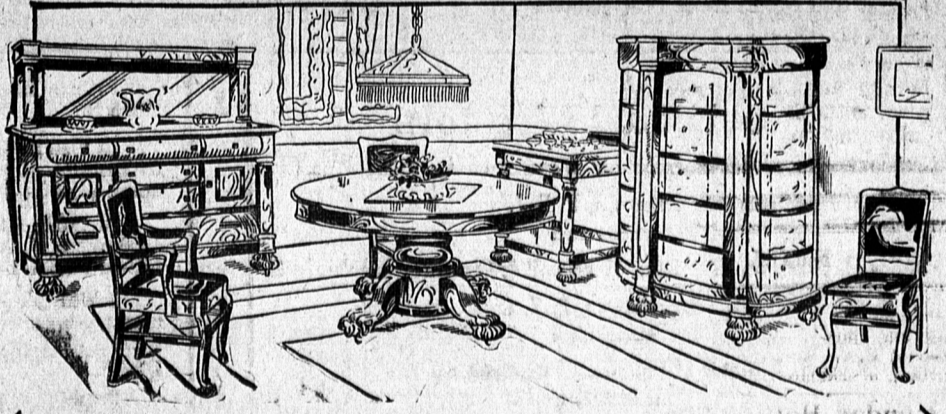
