The thanks of the congregation are due to the ladies, who decorated the Church. It was indeed a "Service of Love, which God alone, knows how to interpret and accept."

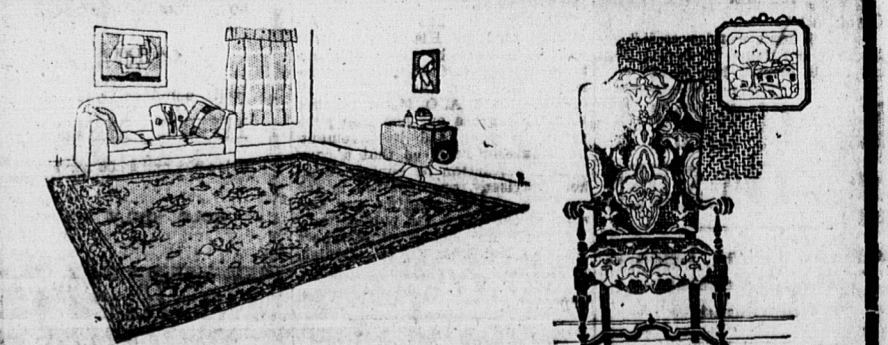
