HUNTER RIVER.—A meeting of unusual interest took place last Thursday afternoon in Hunter River United Church, when the congregation were invited to meet a deputation from the Presbytery to discuss the important question of the boundaries of pastoral charges in this section. Rev. T. A. Wilson, Chairman of Presbytery Committee on Rearrangements took the chair and presented the recommendations sent out by the Presbytery for the consideration of the congregations concerned. After some discussion the plan submitted was found to be a most desirable one and to meet with unanimous approval, but as the change contemplated would disturb working arrangements of the congregations for this current year, it was deemed unwise to bring it into effect till the commencement of the new ecclesiastical year. Meanwhile temporary arrangements are being made which will carry the work along satisfactorily for the present.

TOUR OF CANADA.—The Misses Margaret and Elizabeth Reid of Newport, Scotland, who finished a tour of Canada by a two weeks visit to their brother, Mr. William Reid of Frenchfort left yesterday afternoon on their return journey via Montreal. They left their home in Scotland on July 31st, arriving in Montreal on 9th August. They visited their brother, Edward, in Sherbrooke, Quebec, and later extended their tour westward, visiting Toronto, Ottawa and Whistler, thence via the Lakes to Winnipeg. They also visited Niagara Falls and many other points of interest. This was especially true of Winnipeg, where apparently a large proportion of the population were former neighbors relatives or friends. The Rummage Sale held during the month was very successful; the Board is very grateful to all who assisted both by donation and help.

Mr. Blythe Hurst who has been connected with the Institute for a long number of years has resigned his position; we feel sure that all who knew him will join with us in regretting that he has found it necessary to retire, but as he is not going far away we hope he will be able to visit as often. We wish for him long continued good health with a full share of the pleasure he so richly deserves.

Following this comes better cheer in the form of a donation of thirty four bottles of preserve from Crystal Chapter, Order Eastern Star; this is very acceptable and much appreciated—Thank You Ladies.

In connection with Finances—Through our Campaign Account we have been endeavoring to make a small payment on the debt with which funds were available, depending on—We hoped to find an increase in payments on pledges when produce began to move—please look over your receipts and see how you stand.

The Maintenance Fund has been running very low and the bill for coal alone is of necessity a very large one; several efforts have recently been made to swell this Fund among them the Rummage Sale mentioned above; there is also to be a dance known as The Orphanage Hallowe'en Dance on October 30th; the hall to be announced later; a good time is guaranteed to all who come—the cause is good.
