MARITIME UNION.

The latest issue of The Farmer's Advocate of London, Ont. gives prominence to the discussion of Maritime Union and prints two letters on the subject, one from R. W. Starr of Annapolis, N. S. and the other from the Editor of The Guardian, discussing various phases of the question. The Advocate concludes that the union question is looked upon with most favor in Nova Scotia and least favor in P. E. Island, but that union is desirable and would secure a better class of representatives by affording a wider field and more lucrative opportunity to men of ability. The Advocate is very sympathetic with our Island people in the matter of our winter disabilities and we are glad to record that fact. It treats the union question in a broad and liberal spirit withal, as the following extract from its article will show:

"For Prince Edward Islanders with their intense insular patriotism and their distressing experiences in winter communication, it is particularly harder than any one can imagine who has not been on the ground, perceived the disabilities and got into sympathetic touch with the people—to aspire to this larger idea. But gradually they will become imbued with the exalted ambition, and the time will come when the Straits of Northumberland will no more divide the Islanders and the Mainlanders in their hopes, aspirations and efforts than the municipal boundaries divide their counties today. To effect this, improved and cheapened winter communication by means of a Tunnel under the Straits, if practicable, would help wonderfully, promoting interprovincial intercourse and reconciling the Islanders to the prospect of Maritime Union by conferring upon them this tangible benefit of Federal Union."

A number of able and scholarly articles have appeared during the past summer and fall in the Methodist Quarterly Review of Nashville; the Methodist Review of New York and the Methodist Magazine of Toronto from the pen of Rev. William Harrison of Cornwall, P. E. I. In the Christmas number of the last named Magazine is a striking illustrated paper entitled Some Revenges of History. One of the illustrations shows the profile of Rameses II, the Pharaoh of the oppression, the ten plagues and the Exodus, now unearthed, identified beyond question and photographed in his mummified condition, three thousand years after death for the astonishment and instruction of the world. Mr. Harrison's paper on this theme is particularly eloquent and striking.

Surely when the railway authorities come to consider that all the freight which passes between this Province and the outside world during the winter months goes and comes over the Island Railway to and from Georgetown, the importance of having a telephone at Georgetown station will be seen. Ship pers, consignees and passengers want it and are willing to pay for its use when they use it. It is wanted there simply and entirely in connection with the business of the road and by the patrons of the road. It ought to be placed before the winter business at Georgetown begins.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company advertised for a suitable name for their Pacific terminal station, offering a cash prize of \$250 to the competitor whose choice of name should be adopted. The conditions regulating the competition were few and simple. The name must contain not more than three syllables or ten letters and preference was to be given to names bearing some relation to Canada or British Columbia, or both. Each name was to be accompanied by a short article explaining the reasons for its selection.

The competition closed on December 15 and the Montreal Herald tells how the answers were received. They came in shoals—from five to seven thousand of them—mail bags swelled out to bursting, postmen palpitating and groaning under the weight of the loads they had to carry. At the last some scores of competitors fearing they would be too late sent in names and arguments in support of them by telegraph. It appears from the letters first opened that many competitors did not keep within the rules, but no doubt enough good names were received to make the final choice somewhat embarrassing.

It is remarked that the mother of Professor Osler is in her hundredth year, still has a very active intellect and is much interested in the opinions of her distinguished son concerning old age.

The Guardian is informed that eight of the principal officials of the P. E. Island Railway are supplied with telephones in their houses at the public cost. (If this is not so we will gladly make a correction.) We do not say that all or any of these are not necessary, but we do say that a telephone at Georgetown station is of more consequence to the public and will be a great deal more used in connection with the business of the road in the few months of winter than some of the others are in the entire year.

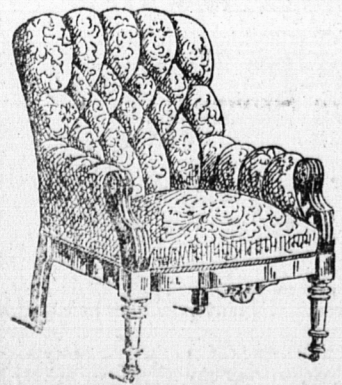

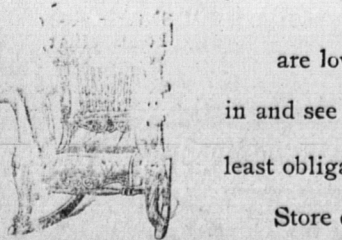

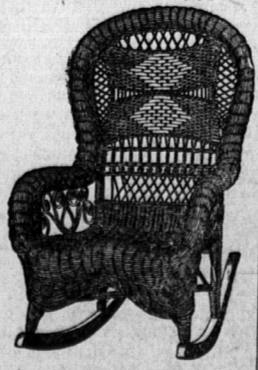
