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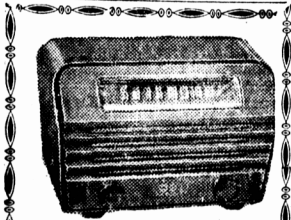

NEWSMAN MISSING

TORONTO, Oct. 3 - (CP) - Robert Reeds, 33-year-old Toronto newspaperman on an exploring trip in his 12-foot sailboat on Hudson Bay, has been missing since Aug. 28. It was learned today, Royal Canadian Mounted Police authorities at Ottawa said aircraft were asked to keep a lookout for the missing writer.
