A GRIM JOKE COMING FROM HALIFAX DISASTER

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 11.—Addressing the Overseas Club yesterday Lieutenant Colonel McKelvey Bell, A. D. M. C., at Halifax, formerly of Ottawa and who saw two years service at the front began his speech by saying that there were very few incidents which could provoke laughter in the grim disaster which had visited Halifax, but he had heard of one. It was at the expense of an artillery officer of this garrison, who lived with his mother, an aged lady. The officer was leaving the house on the morning of the explosion and as he parted from her at the door, he said: "We are going to have artillery practice this morning, and if you hear explosions don't be afraid, it's all right." Half an hour afterwards the Mont Blanc blew up. The old lady was thrown across the room and out of a door. When she recovered sufficiently to speak, she said: "If Willie carries on like this he will lose his job."

HOUSE NOT TO MEET TILL END OF MARCH

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—From present indications Parliament will not meet before the middle and probably not until the end of March. It had been hoped to have the session open about March 1st, but the delay in the soldier vote has made this impossible. The result of the soldiers' vote may not be known for two weeks yet, and in the meantime the only members who could be legally summoned are those elected by acclamation. It is customary to give thirty days' notice of the session in order to give members living in distant parts time to make arrangements to get to Ottawa. This, however, is not necessary. The result of the overseas soldiers' vote will be cabled from London as soon as known and the Government will not wait for corroboration by mail, but will immediately summon the House.

The session is expected to be short, but though brief it will likely be interesting and important. The legislation will almost entirely deal with war questions, and there will be a number of bills confirming action already taken by the Government through order-in-council. There may be additional war taxation most likely an increase in the income tax but it is practically certain that there will not be much change in the tariff. As the Business War Tax, under the terms of the bill, expires this year, and Sir Thomas White having promised that the tax shall be renewed, legislation of this character may be expected.
