Russian Trade With Canada

(Dom. Press Special.) MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—That the \$5,000,000 order recently placed with a Canadian syndicate by the Russian Soviet government is only the first of a number to be given in the dominion is indicated in a statement made by J. G. Ohsol, representative in the United States and Canada of the commercial department of the Russian Socialist federal Soviet republic. He added that the Soviet government was trying to arrange deposit gold in one of the Canadian banks to pay for purchases made in Canada. If this plan is unsuccessful, all goods bought abroad will be paid for at Revel, Esthonia, in gold roubles on presentation of shipping documents.

WORLD'S LARGEST SHIP TO BE HANDED OVER TO ONE OF THE ALLIES

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The world's largest ship, the Hamburg-American liner Bismarck, 56,000 tons, is to be completed immediately and handed over to the Reparation Commission for one of the Allies, according to The Daily Mail.
