MAYOR PATON WAS SWORN IN

Demands For Scrutinies Not Pressed—City Clerk Declares Mayor and Councillors Duly Returned—Councillors Will be Sworn in Today by His Worship Mayor Paton.

The demands for scrutinies, about the outcome of which some doubt was felt, were not pressed yesterday, and when the time limit for receiving such had expired, the City Clerk, W. W. Clark, declared that Mayor Paton and the Councillors who had received the majority of votes polled, were duly returned. Acting with the advice of the Recorder he stated as his reason therefor, that the scrutinies demanded were frivolous owing to the fact that the number of votes marked objected to could not affect the result of the elections as in each case the majorities were greater than the number of votes objected to.

SECTION THIRTEEN OF THE PROHIBITION ACT, 1900

Held Not to Apply to Procuring Liquor in a Dwelling House—Important Decision of the Stipendiary Magistrate Delivered Yesterday in Dismissing Information Against Martin Murray—Not Quite Sure What Words of Section Thirteen Mean.

Following is the full text of the reasons for judgment given yesterday by Stipendiary Magistrate Macdonald in the case of Martin Murray:— Jenkins vs Murray. Charge of breach of Prohibition Act 1900. That the defendant between the 1st day of November, 1905, and the 3rd day of January 1906 did procure intoxicating liquor for William McAleer.
