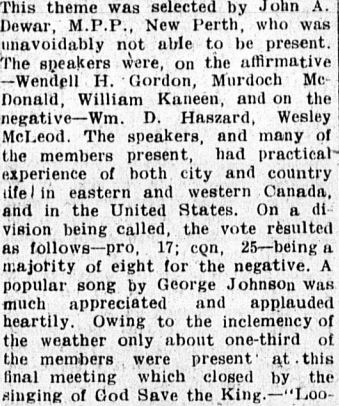
Fishing is reported good. The lobster catch so far this season is much better than last. The cod has struck and there is every indication of this being a bumper year for the fisherman.

TRAIN ROBBERS.

NEW ORLEANS, May 15—Two masked men held up the New Orleans, New York Limited train No. 2, North bound, on the New Orleans and North Eastern Railroad, eight miles South of Hattiesburg, Miss., shortly after midnight this morning, and after dynamiting the safe, in the express car, escaped on horses with one bundle containing \$160,000. The passengers were not molested and no one was hurt. The train proceeded to Hattiesburg, where the city and county officials were notified. Poses formed and mounted on horses, started in pursuit of the robbers, who, it is said, took a Northeasterly direction, evidently heading for the Alabama State line. Five charges of dynamite were exploded in the express car, nearly demolishing it. A through safe, destined from New Orleans to Eastern points, said to contain possibly \$150,000, most of which was Government funds, was blown open and the contents taken.

The train had stopped at Water Lake, just north of Richburg, when the men boarded the express car. At the time nearly all the passengers, except a few who were to leave the train at Hattiesburg, were asleep in their berths. The men first forced the engineer and fireman to leave the engine and together with Conductor Fleming and other members of the train crew, they were lined up against the train and covered with a revolver by one of the robbers, while the other entered the express car and forced the express messengers and a guard, said to be watching the government money, on the train, to get out and join the line. The messengers and guard were they had a chance to make any resistance. After the guards and messenger had disarmed, the robbers, guarding the crew, sent one of them through the coaches with instructions to inform the passengers the train was being held for a certain purpose, and they were safe as long as they remained inside the cars.

Mrs. MacCallum was in her 39th year and leaves to mourn besides her husband, an aged father, two sisters and two brothers. One of the chief mourners was Mrs. MacPhail, a sister of deceased, who arrived from Boston the evening before.

BOY DROWNED IN SPRING.

AMHERST, May 15—A sad accident occurred here this morning resulting in the death of a bright three-year-old boy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Burgess. The parents live on the outskirts of the town and had a half of a barrel sunk in the ground as a well from which to obtain spring water. The little fellow was evidently stooping over to get a drink and fell in head first. He was only out of the house five minutes when his mother went to look for him and found his dead body in the well. The water was less than a foot deep. Mr. and Mrs. Burgess are English immigrants who have lately settled here and much sympathy is felt for them.
