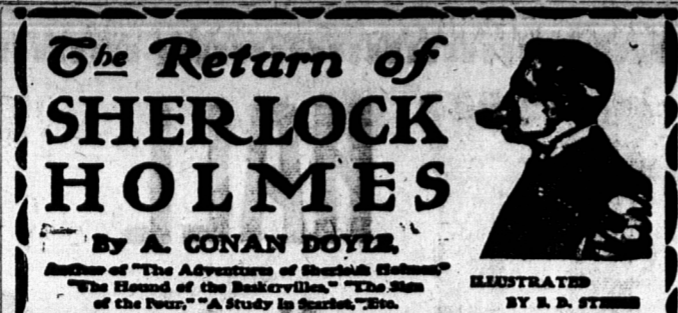

A little later a rakish young workman, with a goatee beard and a swagger, lit his clay pipe at the lamp before descending into the street. He had, as you saw, the best of the first exchange, but my self respect and my reputation are concerned to fight it to a finish."

"Well, I don't like it, but I suppose it must be," said I. "When do we start?"

"You are not coming." "Then you are not going," said I. "I give you my word of honor—and I never broke it in my life—that I will take a cab straight to the police station and give you away unless you let me share this adventure with you."

"You can't help me." "How do you know that? You can't tell what may happen. Anyway my

resolution is taken. Other people besides you have self respect and even reputations."

Holmes had looked annoyed, but his brow cleared, and he clapped me on the shoulder.

"Well, well, my dear fellow, be it so. We have shared this same room for some years, and it would be amusing if we ended by sharing the same cell. You know, Watson, I don't mind confessing to you that I have always had an idea that I would have made a big game of my lifetime in that direction. See here!" He took a neat little leather case out of a drawer and, opening it, he exhibited a number of shining instruments. "This is a first class up to date burgling kit, with nickel plated jimmy, diamond tipped glass cutter, adaptable keys and every modern improvement which the march of civilization demands.
