**Few More Contracts
For Large Calibres**

TORONTO—"In order to extend our present contract and not close down completely, we have laid off 750 men and 350 women, until such time as we receive new contracts," stated Mr. P. C. Brooks, vice-President of the Fairbanks' Morse Company. Mr. J. W. Flavell, chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, explains development in the National factories in England, has reached the point where no further assistance was required from the Canadian factories at the present time in the manufacture of 8 inch and 9.2 inch shells, but he said, there was no falling off in contracts for lighter shells. "We feel that while we should go on with our regular work of keeping men in good physical condition," said Mr. Warburton today, "that we should not now go in for sport in an organized way. There are so many other ways of utilizing physical energy that we no longer consider sport as such necessary. We want our members to co-operate actively in the work of production and we are anxious to avoid doing anything that might hamper in any way the work of cultivation. We feel that it is legitimate to keep young men and boys in good health but we think the element of competition might well be eliminated at this time."

**HONORS SUNDAY
FOR HIS ENEMIES**

"I honor Billy Sunday for the enemies he has made. He is one of the greatest men in America today." So the Rev. W. E. Baker, of the First Congregational Church, Montreal, greeted the celebrated evangelist in his sermon Sunday evening, although he, his doctrine and his church come under the blanket condemnation of the Sunday orthodox, and are headed to eternal damnation and hellfire. "Taking as his text, 'There came a man from the Lord, and his name was John,' he reviewed it for the occasion and the twentieth century to read: 'There came a man from the Lord, and his name was Billy Sunday.'"

Believes in His Sincerity

"The uncouth language and antics are as characteristic and inseparable from the man as the fragrance from the rose," declared Rev. Mr. Baker. "While I do not believe in Billy Sunday's doctrine which preaches a doctrine of fear, and would reform the world through the attraction of the prospects of eternal felicity or the eternal tortures of hell, I do believe in his sincerity. "If there was a yellow streak in Billy Sunday or a thread of dishonesty in his makeup, his enemies, who are hot on his trail all the time, and have been for thirty years, would have found it before this. "I honor Billy Sunday for the enemies he has made. There isn't a brewer, a saloon keeper, a crook, a gangster, a gambler, or a pandarer in the world who doesn't hate him. "Doing Great Work

"I can't believe that if the Lord were to write one word in the heavens it would be fear rather than love, and that the orthodox that preach a heaven with golden streets and a hell of fire and brimstone is the only salvation, but I do believe that Billy Sunday is doing a great work, and the spirit of God is in it. "I cannot see why those who do not agree with Billy Sunday in doctrine should be condemned with the obvious forces of evil, but this narrow-mindedness, I believe, is Billy Sunday's weakness, and his work is great in spite of it. "The essence of his preaching is a plea to men to forget their meanness, to follow the teachings of Jesus, and

get to work. "His message is personal. As Jesus in the first century reached out to Matthew, Mark and Luke to make them no longer fishers of fish, but fishers of men, so Billy Sunday in the twentieth century carries the message to every Tom, Dick and Harry, that they may know what Christianity means to them, and their part in it."

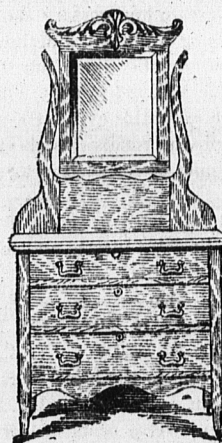
