**ANOTHER CANADIAN CONTINGENT.**

A cable despatch has been received at Ottawa from the High Commissioner in London conveying the important news that the British Government has accepted the Canadian Government's offer to provide another armed contingent for service in South Africa. The force will consist of six hundred Mounted Infantry. It will afford an opportunity for those Canadians who are physically qualified and desirous to render service to the Empire to do so, and we doubt not that the required number will be readily obtained. The young men of Canada, many of whom are trained to an active outdoor life, possess all the qualifications of courage and hardihood which go to make soldiers of the better class.

The service will be purely voluntary, it is needless to say. No one will be asked to go who does not desire to do so. And the service will be arduous, until the war is completed. The fact that another Canadian Contingent is now accepted may be taken as evidence that the Imperial authorities do not expect the termination of hostilities for some months to come, as it will necessarily occupy some time to enrol the men and transport them to the front. At the best they can hardly be placed in the fighting line sooner than the middle of January next. We are pleased to learn that the Canadian offer has been accepted. Australia has done more than Canada to keep her sons in the field and this had been made the occasion of some unfavorable comment.

War is at its best a terrible calamity, but there is a stern duty devolving upon the Mother Country to restore order and peace in South Africa. That task cannot be abandoned until it is completed. To complete it in the shortest practicable time is an object alike in the interest of peace and humanity. To that end men are wanted, and Canadians have as much interest as other British subjects in maintaining the supremacy of the old flag. Besides, if Canada were attacked we should have the British army and navy to defend us. To give us a just claim to defence, we ought to be willing to share in the general defence of the Empire. This we believe is the general feeling of the King's Canadian subjects.

The Montreal Herald has issued a special Thanksgiving number of decided merit—something for our enterprising contemporary's readers to be thankful for.

Our civic wants are yet numerous. We need a public library, a free letter delivery and better protection for the public health. We need street numbers on shops and dwellings, to follow up the naming of the streets and make the directory really valuable. We need more good hose for the fire department. We need more general regard for the Curfew By-law, although we think it has already accomplished some good. We need a more energetic enforcement of the prohibitory law. All these and other wants have been from time to time pointed out by THE GUARDIAN, and we shall not rest satisfied until they are supplied.

No building of more than twelve storeys in height is permitted to be erected in London. Twenty storeys in height has been attained by a number of buildings in New York, Chicago and other American cities and in one case plans were prepared and declared by an eminent builder to be perfectly practicable for a building 125 storeys high. It is not yet built, but the century is still young. In the meantime a lease for 999 years of a site on London Strand has been applied for with a 750 foot frontage. On this site an American office building costing \$10,000,000, containing 6,000 offices and provided with thirty elevators, is to be erected.

Some years ago Rev. Mr. Maxwell, pastor of a Presbyterian church in Vancouver, took an active part in promoting civic reform in that City. His admirers soon elected him to the City Council and afterwards to Parliament, where he still holds a seat. Now we are told that Rev. Dr. McLaren, pastor of St. Andrews church, Vancouver, who has recently taken a prominent part in the crusade against gambling houses and other places of evil resort there, is proposed as a candidate for the Mayoralty. We do not doubt that he would make a good Mayor, but we have some doubt as to whether he would be an equally good pastor after entering civic politics. As a rule it is not a good thing for a pastor to get an election bee in his bonnet.

Hereafter the letter carriers in cities will be equipped with whistles so that on calling at residences with letters the resident may know who it is that seeks admittance. The ring or knock at the door hitherto executed by the postman was not always as promptly responded to as it should be, thus causing loss of time. The letter carrier is usually a welcome visitor in those cities where carriers are employed. When shall we hear the carrier's whistle in Charlottetown?

The British House of Commons from time immemorial has been in the habit of getting down to business at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and sitting till a late hour in the night. The proposed new procedure will, if adopted, begin the sittings two hours earlier, with the object of closing also at an earlier hour than heretofore. The majority of men who made names for themselves in history, including King Alfred, Frederick the Great, Napoleon, John Wesley and scores of others began their day's work when the day began, or earlier and slept at night. The Parliaments would do well also to transact the greater part of their business in the day time.
