Currencies

NEW YORK, May 19—(CP)—The Canadian dollar failed to hold an early gain in foreign exchange market today and closed 3-16 of a cent lower in relation to the United States dollar. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.)

The pound Sterling finished for the sixth day in succession unchanged at \$4.03 1-2. The Swiss "commercial" franc was down 0.15 cent at 23.20 1-2 cents, while the German mark and the Argentine free peso each advanced 0.5 cent. The Nazi currency was quoted at 4.05 and the Argentine unit at 23.80 cents.

FINANCE

NEW YORK, May 19—(AP)—The stock market today ambled through one of the slowest sessions in the past 25 years without developing any real strength or weakness in any department.

Canadian stocks were generally irregular. International Nickel and Imperial Oil gained 1-8 while Lake Shore lost 3-8. Other losers were Distillers Seagram and Ford, each 1-8 point lower, and Brazilian Traction, down 1-4.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 39.6. Of the 530 individual issues traded, 170 were up, 179 down and 181 unchanged. Transfers of 223,010 shares actually were the smallest for a full stretch since Aug. 28, last, and there have not been many under this figure since 1916. The total compared with 287,000 Friday.

Shares on the upside at the close included U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Standard Oil (NJ), Texas Corp., Phillips Petroleum, Anaconda Smelting, General Motors, Western Union, Consolidated Edison, Phelps Dodge, U. S. Gypsum, Du Pont, Pullman and Chesapeake & Ohio.

Public Service of N.J. edged into new low ground for the year or longer. In arrears also were Santa Fe, N.Y. Central, Eastman Kodak, Sperry, Glenn Martin, American Telephone and Chrysler.

Grain

CHICAGO, May 19—(AP)—An outbreak of buying whirled wheat prices upward for net gains of 3 cents a bushel just before noon today.

New high prices for more than a year were posted, with May wheat quoted as high as \$1.02 3-8.

Heavy profit-taking lowered wheat about a cent after the day's peaks were reached but wheat closed 1 7-8-2 1-8 higher than Saturday, May 17 1-4. July 3-4-3-4-8. Corn was 3-8-3-4 higher, May 71 3-4, July 73 3-8-3-4; oats unchanged to 3-8 higher.

WINNIPEG, May 19—(CP)—On Winnipeg grain exchange today, futures prices held unchanged, May wheat 1-8 cent over its 75 7-8-99 cent peg and July at its minimum of 77 1-2 cents a bushel. Buenos Aires quotations were unchanged.

Livestock

MONTREAL, May 19—(CP)—Cattle were estimated to be 15 to 25 cents higher today on the two Montreal livestock markets, the Dominion Livestock Branch reported. Veals were placed at 25 to 50 cents higher and hogs, on early sales, 25 cents higher.

Good steers sold from \$8.75 to \$9.25, medium \$7.75 to \$8.50 with common from \$6 to \$7.50. Heifers were mostly \$8 to \$8.50 for good and \$7 to \$7.75 for fair and medium. Good cows were \$6.75 to \$7.25, medium \$5.75 to \$6.50 and common butcher cows from \$5 to \$5.75. Canners and cutters were mostly \$4 to \$4.50 odd sales as low as \$4. Good bulls were from \$6.50 to \$7.25 odd lot \$7.50. Common bulls were mostly \$5 to \$6.25 with a low of \$4.50.

Receipts were: cattle 937, calves 1,544, sheep 198, hogs 915.

Calves were 25 to 50 cents higher than last week. Good quality veals made \$9 to \$9.75 with two tops at \$10.50 with medium veals from \$8.25 to \$9 and common light veals down to \$7. The bulk of the calves offered were down to just fair and veals and drinkers and were sold in mixed lots from \$6 to \$7.25. Drinkers ranged from \$6 to \$7.50 and grassers \$4.50 to \$5.

Spring lambs ranged from \$4.75 to \$9 according to weight and quality. Common light lambs are not wanted. Sheep were from \$3 to \$6.50, selling mostly in mixed lots between \$6 and \$6.50.

Early lots of hogs were at \$12.75 for B-1 dressed, \$9.75 for B-1 live fed and watered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Feeder hogs were \$9.50 to \$11 according to weight and quality. Sows were \$5.75 to \$7 live weight.

TORONTO, May 19—(CP)—Trading in the second heaviest volume of the month, listings on the Toronto exchange recorded moderate strength today. Turnover aggregated 165,000 shares.

The price of Lake Shore touched 15 1-8, the lowest price reached since 1929 and the close at 15 1-2. Involved a net decline of 1 1-8.

Lake Shore totalled 1,500 shares. Kerr-Addison and Preston were both fairly active at gains of 10 and 3 cents respectively and other gold gainers on smaller volume were East Malartic, Macassa, McKenzie, O'Brien, Sheep Creek, Sylvanite and Upper Canada.

The close was down narrowly for God's Lake, Little Long Lac, Negus, Pickle Crow, Sigma and Wright-Hargreaves. Lapa Cadillac and Central Porcupine traded in volume at a gain of a fraction for Porcupine and loss of a fraction for Cadillac. Lowell Rouyn weakened 10 to 55.

HON. W. A. BUCHANAN, CHAIRMAN

ONCE in a while you'll meet a Doubting Thomas . . . He probably sings either one of these two tunes:


Perhaps he exclaims, "Why all the campaigning? Our newspapers ARE free now, aren't they?"

Or else he's way over at the other end, yelling that "criticism divides our will to win!"


Both extremes are half-truths. And that's just where the danger is . . .

Because you DO have a free press now . . . and criticism CAN run all out into destructive partisanship.

The problem is to KEEP the press free, which means free from distortion either way!



And make no mistake. To keep that freedom, you'll have to want to keep it, you'll have to work to keep it . . . The change is very hard to see! A Nazi paper translated into English would look very much like the one you're used to. If you read it, you'd find a totalitarian paper part tragic, part funny. But that would only be because your papers have given you the FACTS. The totalitarian press is told what the people are to know, which is to say what they are to believe. And they



do believe it because they know no better. Every scrap of their initiative, every bit of their judgment is gone because they have no standards by which to judge.

"But do we Canadians run such risks?" You do . . . but only if you complacently sit back and think you don't! The danger is real only if you stop actively wanting your freedom. The danger begins inside a country, slowly and subtly, with apparently harmless voluntary restrictions . . .

The responsibility is partly ours. The newspapers must deserve to stay free. But it is your responsibility, too . . . your personal responsibility, because it is your personal liberty which can be threatened.

HOW can you help? You can help keep the press free for yourself and your children simply by refusing to tolerate it any other way! Read your newspaper a little more carefully than you do now. Ask yourself, what does that mean? where will this restriction lead? Talk with your neighbour about what you read. When you think something isn't going as it should in a democracy of free men . . . do something about it! Phone the publisher, write the editor! Above all, do your part to keep out of the trap of complacency! Soothing syrup has no place here!
