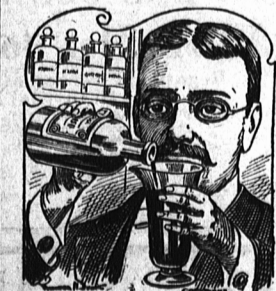

The interest in the work of the Summer School of Science at Yarmouth N. S. increases with each day's work. Classes are growing larger and more enthusiastic. The most largely attended and the most inspiring class in the school is the one in English Literature under the skilful direction of Miss Eleanor Robinson of St. John, N. B.

The works that are studied and discussed are Shakespeare's "Coriolanus" and Scott's "Old Mortality". As these works are correlated with other works by the same authors and also with the works of other authors a wide and intelligent idea of English Literature as a whole is obtained. The benefit derived from this class alone would more than repay the thoughtful student for his attendance at the school. Excellent opportunity is afforded by the neighborhood of Yarmouth for Field Work and on almost every afternoon an enthusiastic class is found afield. During one of the tramps an observant member of the school discovered a fern, one of sensitive variety, that had not been listed in the Nova Scotia list of ferns.
